

BUY MANY BONDS OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS

State Land Board Acts on Numerous Applications at Monday Meeting — Jones Named Carey Act Agent.

The state land board at its regular meeting Monday authorized the purchase of a number of school district bonds and appointed R. O. Jones of American Falls as Carey act agent for the American Falls Canal company.

Boise, Feb. 3.—The state board of land commissioners of the state of Idaho met this day in regular session. Charles F. Brown, Horeshoe Bend, personally appeared before the board in relation to application to lease which had been filed by him covering land in section 16, 7 north, 2 east, which land is now under lease to Andrew Little and Carlisle Smith.

It was moved by Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon, and unanimously carried, that the matter of approval of the lease to Little and Smith covering section 16, township 7 north, range 2 east, be continued until such time as a decision from the district court is had in the Campbell brothers case now pending, and that Charles F. Brown, George Flake, M. McDonough and Clark Cox be notified of any further action of the board in reference to said lease.

E. R. Dampier, representing John Brooke, appeared before the board in relation to lease application covering section 16, township 3 north, range 24 east, which land has been leased to Byron F. Morrison, Martin, Inasmuch as Mr. Brooke did not receive registered notice of conflict, he is asking that the land be put up at auction and lease of Mr. Morrison cancelled.

It was moved by Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that lease on this land be not approved until a decision has been had in the Blaine county East Side case now pending in the district court, and that E. R. Dampier, Rupert, be sent notice of any further action.

This being the date set for the hearing in relation to the acceptance as completed of the North Side project's canal and lateral system, and none of the parties interested appearing, it was moved by Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that the matter be passed for the present.

It was moved by Auditor Gallet, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that R. O. Jones, of American Falls, be appointed Carey act agent for the American Falls Canal & Power company.

Request of Nell J. Jensen and Harry Jensen for sale of lands in Twin Falls county was presented to the board. Whereupon it was moved by Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that inasmuch as the land board is compiling the applications from the various counties for the sale of land and which compilation is not yet at hand, that the application of Jensen brothers for sale be not acted upon until such compilation is completed and that the register notify said Jensen brothers that the \$125 tendered is to cover expenses of sale on land and not to be credited on purchase price whether Jensen brothers or any one else purchase said land.

It was moved by Superintendent of Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that school bonds of District No. 12, Owyhee county in the sum of \$2000 be approved and loans granted.

It was moved by Superintendent of Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that school bonds of District No. 6, Gooding county in the sum of \$2500 be approved and loans granted.

It was moved by Superintendent of

Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and carried unanimously, that partial payments on school bonds and state land loan mortgages be accepted at regular interest paying dates in sums of \$100 or multiples thereof.

Upon motion of Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon and carried unanimously, the register was instructed to take up tax certificates covering property secured by state's mortgage on the Harry Sawyer loan No. 582, if said property is under foreclosure.

It was moved by Superintendent of Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that school bonds of Washington county, District No. 48, in the sum of \$4000 be approved and loans granted.

It was moved by Superintendent of Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that school bonds of District No. 21, Boundary county, in the sum of \$2500, be approved and loans granted.

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YEAMAN MAKES ABLE FIGHT IN SENATE

Bonneville County Solon Points Out Defects in Booth Water-power Measure Is Committee Chairman.

Senator M. B. Yeaman of Bonneville county, chairman of the state affairs committee, which thrashed out the water power taxation bill by Booth, is receiving the congratulations of his friends for the able fight he put up against the measure and its defects which he pointed out to the committee. In reporting the recommendation of the committee Senator Yeaman stated that the bill had received more consideration before the state affairs committee than any other yet presented to it and after a thorough analysis it was considered unworthy and hence the recommendation.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Just as the debate on the Women's compensation bill began to get interesting in the senate Monday afternoon, Senator Lee of Bingham county, who carries a long petition for his constituents asking for its amendment, quashed further talk on the measure by moving that the committee on the whole arise and report progress, which motion was seconded and carried.

Thraillkill of Ada announced his position on the measure, declaring that as the bill exempted the farmer, he felt it should also exempt clerical help.

Senator Mason of Shoshone attempted to put over an amendment that the bill be amended to include farm labor in its operation and received a second. Mason contended that farm hands on a ranch were just as much entitled to insurance against accident as were miners.

Further debate on the measure was stopped by the timely motion on the part of Lee.

Public Instruction Miss Redfield, seconded, voted upon and unanimously carried, that school bonds of District No. 8, Blaine county in the sum of \$4000 be approved and loans granted.

It was moved by Attorney General Black, seconded, voted upon and carried unanimously, that the state engineer be directed to examine land in the Owyhee irrigation project for which the company is requesting patent, for the purpose of making a report to the Interior Department for patent and that he submit his report as early as date as possible, and that the register notify the officers of the company that the engineer is so doing and for them to appear here at our meeting when such report is submitted.

Whereupon the board adjourned subject to call of the Chairman.

Turkish territories or the new republics which are struggling upward in eastern and southeastern Europe.

AMERICA ONLY HOPE. "The only hope for the world's future is for America to step into world politics and give the league the necessary financial backing to put its program on a sound basis.

"We recognize that one of the chief difficulties in maintenance of the league is that democratic states are loath to commit themselves indefinitely to supplying troops to fight in any part of the world to uphold the league's authority. That difficulty need not arise. Great Britain and the United States are recognized as holding the chief weapon of the league, economic pressure—the method for enforcing which is naval force. If the United States and Great Britain agree to place their naval power at the disposal of the league, I don't see how any nation will ever again even dare to think of war.

"If the United States and Great Britain had been able in 1914 to apply to Germany a blockade such as they applied early in 1918, it is doubtful if Germany would ever have started the war. Certainly she could not have continued it very long.

"Germany has learned the effectiveness of the blockade as a weapon, and it is most unlikely that she can ever build a fleet capable of competing with us for some generations. Therefore, one of the beginnings of the security of the world—the aim and object of the league—will be naval co-operation by Great Britain and America in behalf of the league. America's share of this weapon must correspond to her wealth and importance.

"In peace time the seas are naturally free. The conferees are now taking up the question of waterways and ports, whereby they will be made even more free. If war threatens the league, there is no saying how far this freedom will be limited through blockade or other means."

With arrangements all complete for the trial of the \$40,000 damage suit against the Boise Valley Traction company because of the killing of John M. Evans on Sept. 7, 1916, by an interurban car at Yost station, a settlement was effected out of court Monday afternoon and the case ordered dismissed by Judge Reddoch.

Only a verbal order of the dismissal was made and the terms of settlement were not entered, but it is understood the case was settled for less than \$1500.

Mr. Evans was manager of the Boise Valley Packing company at Eagle and was killed when struck by a Nampa bound car on the Boise Valley Traction company's line near the Yost station.

Suit against the company was brought by his heirs, consisting of his son and members of his immediate family.
