

### SEN. GALLIVAN FLAYS MILITARY HEADS FOR KEEPING WOOD HOME

#### Democratic House Leader's Denunciation of Alleged Abuse Handed Popular Former Staff Chief Stirs Congress.

#### NO PARTY ISSUE, HE SAYS; DEMANDS THOROUGH QUIZ

#### Soldiers' Letters Declare Wood Treated Like German Spy When Visiting at Front; Charge Yanks Sacrificed.

(Capital News Special Service) Washington, Feb. 13.—Evidence that resentment of the treatment accorded General Leonard Wood in suppressing his well-earned right to a conspicuous part in the war just closed is not mere partisan politics is disclosed in the attitude of James A. Gallivan, of Massachusetts, one of the ablest Democrats in the house.

Representative Gallivan has been assailing the high command of the American expeditionary force recently in speeches which have stirred congress as have no other utterances with reference to this war, in congress or out.

He has made sensational charges regarding mistreatment of soldiers and officers and the enlisted men and has spared no one from Secretary Baker to General Pershing, declaring in his latest speech, "It is no party question, and the party which tries to shield the guilty ones will go down to defeat."

Gallivan is to the house what Chamberlain is to the senate, a Democrat fighting fearlessly against military abuses whether perpetrated by men of his own party or the opposing party. Like Chamberlain, he was a devoted friend of Roosevelt's and introduced in the house the same special resolution which Chamberlain introduced in the senate to authorize sending Roosevelt to Europe with a division of picked volunteers.

#### BACKED BY OFFICERS.

The latest speech by Mr. Gallivan was to place in the record some letters received from soldiers approving of his former strictures on the high command. He said he had received more than 400 letters from army officers and soldiers commenting upon war conditions since his first speech of two or three weeks ago. One letter came from 40 wounded officers in a base hospital and, in part, said:

"When General Wood visited our front, he was treated more like a German spy than an officer of the United States. We have the word of several colonels that know him well for this. He was hurried through his visit, and ordered back home without allowing him to visit the Italian front, or returning through England as he was invited to do by Lloyd George. General Wood was the idol of the army, officers and men alike, was one of our most efficient officers, yet he was kept in a corner here at home. Who did it? "You're absolutely right as to the high command. God bless you for it; it is all we can say."

"We can prove to you that scores of men were sacrificed because the officers in command were ambitious for promotion and ordered needless advances, or those that would show up spectacularly in their favor, which were of no material advantage to the general advance, and would not have been ordered if they had had to risk their own lives with their men and lower officers."

"We read with joy and thankfulness your speech in the house, in which you discussed the A. E. F. high command, and are writing this to give you a few hints, which if you will follow them up will reveal in state of affairs that no one has dreamed of."

**WORSE THAN CZARISM.**  
"It has been impossible for any one to criticize. If you did it here you were pro-German; if you said anything 'over there' you were sent home in disgrace. The czar of Russia in his palmy days never enjoyed the autocratic power that the staff enjoyed here and abroad."

"Brest was unspeakable as a place to keep soldiers. Prison officials here would have been sent to prison for a term of years that would have dared to keep prisoners in such a hole. Yet we dumped our soldiers there out of sanitary camps, where they were well

housed and well fed. Thousands fell ill of diarrhoea and dysentery and hundreds from pneumonia because of it.

At no time was this remedied, yet at all times we had labor battalions there and engineers to do the work, but were too busy building France a part of entry that is excelled by none, to properly house and care for our soldiers. Pages could be written and then half would not be told you. Some of us were sent home that way and found conditions no better than last May and June. Yet the secretary of war says it was ideal when he saw it a few months ago. We only wish he had to spend the time there under the conditions we did."
