

### NATIONAL COUNCIL RESEARCH DIVISION NOW ESTABLISHED

State Organization Informed Creation of Reconstruction and Survey Work Body Completed.

### TO DIGEST OPINIONS

Suggestions Welcomed With Criticism to Help Solve Problems Facing Country—Valuable Information at Hand.

The council of national defense has notified the Idaho state council of defense of the creation of a reconstruction research division or board to study the serious council problems that confront the nation and every state council and to keep them advised with regard to developments.

The council of national defense has created a reconstruction research division. This division is the outgrowth of the reconstruction and survey work organized and carried on by Director Clarkson for the past five months by direction of the council and under the specific authority of the president.

The prime intention of this research organization has not been to determine policies. It has sought to analyze the problems of reconstruction and readjustment, to find out what congress and federal and civic agencies are doing to solve them, and to digest the opinions of experts and responsible leaders of the thought concerning the activities of the federal agencies particularly. Recently a similar study of the activities of state agencies has been started.

### TO STUDY SITUATION

The reconstruction research division will continue to record the adjustments in trade and shipping made by the war trade board, shipping board, railroad administration, and other agencies created to exercise control during the war. Complete files of the orders, releases, and other official documents concerning these agencies are being kept and careful records made of their development, organization and discontinuance.

Early in the fall the reconstruction and readjustment work of the various federal agencies was recorded, mapped, and carefully charted. The material was circulated freely among the federal agencies as a basis for closest co-ordination of their activities and with the obvious result of preventing overlapping effort. Almost any one of the reconstruction problems requires special action on the part of every federal agency. Demobilization, for example, has required the efforts of the treasury, war, interior, agriculture and labor departments, and of the shipping board, railroad administration, and council of national defense. The charting and recording of these activities will be continued and expanded. Information has been and will continue to be assembled concerning the readjustment activities of private agencies, national and international, and the official activities of more than a score of foreign countries. With the opening of the state legislatures a service is being established whereby their reconstruction activities are to be tabulated in forms that will doubtless be of service to other legislatures.

### BOISE MAN DESCRIBES A NEW PROCESS AT QUICKSILVER MINES

Gustave Kroeger has returned from a trip to California and Oregon, during which he visited several of the largest mines in both states.

While in California, Mr. Kroeger held a conference with several of the leading quicksilver producers, and also paid a visit to the Rutherford mine, one of the old famous quicksilver mines in the golden state which has in operation one of the new rotary furnaces for extracting the metal from the ore.

This type of furnace seems to promise great results, according to Mr. Kroeger, and at a number of mines is replacing the Scott furnace, which for many years held the foremost place in the treatment of mercury ores.

Both the installation and operation of the rotary furnace are a great deal cheaper than the Scott furnace, and besides, there is danger of mercury poisoning the workmen. It has a daily working capacity of from 40 to 60 tons of ore. The Monumental Mercury Mining company, of which Mr. Kroeger is secretary, is contemplating the installing of a rotary furnace at its mine in the Yellow Pine mining district in Valley county, this state, during the coming season. Reports from the mine continue favorable says Mr. Kroeger.

### FUNDS APPORTIONED SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Total of \$88,279.54 Go to Fifty-Nine in Ada County—Considerable Increase of Last Year.

The work of apportioning the state and county school money to the various districts in Ada county has been completed by Miss Laura V. Palko, superintendent of public instruction. The state funds apportioned amounted to \$11,100.77 and the county funds \$77,178.77 or a total of \$88,279.54.

As a comparison, the apportionment of Jan., 1918, shows the state money amounted to \$13,425.37 and the county school fund \$63,009.07 or a total of \$76,434.44 which is \$11,843.67 less than is received by the districts this year.
