

LOCATION BILL PROMISES LIVELY HOUSE DISCUSSION

Pending Measure to Create Commission Recommending Permanent Home of Institutions.

While the Albon removal and consolidation bill was defeated without debate, this is not likely to be true of house bill 203 by the state affairs committee...

As soon as practicable and not more than 30 days after the appointment of said commission, said commission shall meet at some convenient place within the state of Idaho and organize...

RECOMMEND TO LEGISLATURE. When the permanent location of said institutions shall have been decided upon by said commission, the decision of the commission shall be certified by said commission to the secretary of state to be by him transmitted to both houses of the 1921 session of the legislature of the state of Idaho.

That for the purpose of defraying the expenses of said commission, there is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund not otherwise appropriated the sum of \$5000.

Every person who gives or offers to give a bribe to any member of said commission, or to another person for him, or attempts by menace, deceit or suppression of truth, or any corrupt means, to influence a member in rendering his decision as a member of said commission, is guilty of a felony.

TO CHANGE CONTRACTS

Amendments to Workmen's Compensation Act Proposed in Bill in the House.

Hospital contracts provided for under the provisions of the workmen's compensation act will be changed if house bill No. 131 becomes a law.

The bill proposes to amend section 256-1 of section one, relating to hospital contracts, as follows: "Such hospital contracts or agreements must provide for medical, hospital and surgical attendance for such employees for sickness contracted during the employment, as well as for injuries received, arising out of and in the course of employment; Provided, however, no such contract or agreement need provide for venereal diseases or sickness as a result of intoxication, or for such contagious or infectious diseases as shall be required by the laws of this state or the rules of the state board of health or any county board of health to be quarantined or confined in a county hospital or in a common hospital maintained jointly by a county and a municipality for the care of contagious and infectious diseases, and employees affected with such contagious or infectious diseases shall be cared for at the expense of the county in which the employee so afflicted shall be confined, as in the case of other persons so afflicted in such county."

'Y' ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR ITS CAMPAIGN

Committee of Business Men Appointed to Serve as Executive Board; Campaign to Start March 4; 120 in Drive.

Impetus was given the arrangements for the \$165,000 campaign for the Y. M. C. A. new building fund when it was announced that the following well known business men have consented to serve as the executive committee for the drive: Messrs. C. A. Barton, chairman; C. C. Anderson; Walter S. Bruce; Edgar A. Crooks; R. M. Davidson; Judge F. S. Dietrich; P. F. Johnson; Max Mayfield; F. I. Newhouse; W. N. Northrop; Dr. R. L. Nourse; Paul H. Spangenberg and Clarence H. White.

This committee will develop the organization and further plans for the campaign, which is scheduled for seven days, March 4-11. The executive committee held its first meeting last night at the Y. M. C. A. building at 7:45 o'clock.

Two divisions of workers are to be formed, each made up of sixty men divided into teams of ten workers each. Each division will be directed by a leader and an associate leader and each team will be in charge of a captain.

International Secretary Ernest L. Mogge, is in Boise co-operating in the conduct of the campaign.


