

# Y. M. C. A. CAMPAIGN GIVEN IMPETUS BY CLUB INDORSEMENT

### Building Considered Much Desired Civic Improvement—Joint Conference Was Held Tuesday.

The Y. M. C. A. new building campaign has received decided impetus from the fact that the board of directors of the Commercial club has endorsed it as a very much desired civic improvement in Boise. Chairman C. A. Burton and Max Mayfield of the campaign executive committee and general secretary Richard E. Handall met with the Commercial club directors and presented information relative to the new building plans, then withdrawing while the directors gave the matter consideration.

Secretary Randall of the Y. M. C. A. has received the following communication from the Commercial club: Boise, Ida., Feb. 26, 1919. Mr. R. E. Handall, secretary Y. M. C. A., Boise, Ida. Dear Mr. Handall: At a meeting of the board of directors held today the question of endorsing your proposed plan for the erection of a new Y. M. C. A. building in our city received consideration, and on motion the board of directors went on record as heartily endorsing, as a civic improvement, the erection of your proposed four-story building.

### TO COMPLETE ORGANIZATION.

The entire campaign organization is expected to be complete by tonight when the executive and citizens' advisory committees meet in joint conference at the association building at 7:45 o'clock. Team captains are also invited to be present at this meeting. Of the 12 teams, comprising 120 workers, the first five being completed were to be regarded as honor teams. This quintet of combinations were all reported to campaign director Mogge and the Nationals, which are under the direction of Frank I. Newhouse, scored four points to one for the Americans led by E. A. Crooks. Manager Crooks states however that his captains were sacrificing speed for quality and believes that when the active drive opens next Tuesday, the salesmanship strength of his mobilized man power will give Manager Newhouse constant concern to keep in the running.

## WITH THE WOMEN

Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, who has long been prominent in New York for her active work in behalf of women and women workers, is to head the women delegates from United States to the peace conference. This is not the first time that Mrs. Harriman has been chosen to represent the women of the country. She was the only woman member appointed to the federal industrial relations committee.

Her present mission means more to the women of the world than can be realized at first. Women have been trying since the beginning of the peace talks to get representation at the peace table and it was but a few days ago that announcement was made in Paris that they had succeeded. That is, four out of the five powers dominating the peace congress have assented to the request for representation of women on all peace conference committees dealing with the interests of women and children.

According to the cable from Paris, Baron Sonnino, the Italian foreign minister, gave Italy's assent, after the United States, Great Britain and France had declared themselves in favor of the idea.

Japan is the fifth power and the only one to deny women the privilege extended by the other countries. The American delegates on the International Women's Council are Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, Mrs. Juliet Barrett Ribbles and Miss Katherine B. Davis.

### MICHIGAN'S FIRST.

Mrs. Dora H. Stockman of Lansing, Mich., has been nominated by the Republican state convention as one of the party's two candidates for member of the state board of agriculture. This is the first time in the history of Michigan that a woman has been chosen candidate for a state elective office.

### HERE AND THERE.

Mrs. J. B. Hughes, recently elected as an assemblyman in the California legislature, is seeking the chairmanship of the committee on education.

Three hundred and twenty-two women have entered the preliminary examinations of the British Institute of Bankers.

One of the largest subjects to be taken under review by a committee of distinguished women of Great Britain is that of the future place of women in agriculture.

The Springfield, Mass., chamber of commerce is sponsor for a plan to bring over 100 French girls to study American business methods at the Springfield High school of commerce.

Large organizations of women the country over are co-operating with the government in attempting to find employment for those women war workers now thrown out of positions.

Women are now strongly entrenched in the railroad service, their number having increased from 60,000 in January, 1918, to 101,000 in October. So far the government has announced no definite policy of turning their jobs back to men.

The best estimate of the employment service that about 1,500,000 women out of 11,000,000 female workers were doing men's work when the war ended and reports indicated the number had been reduced only slightly.
