

GOVERNOR SIGNS BILLS AUTHORIZING TWO NEW HOSPITALS

Issues Statement Declaring He Approves Measure With Pleasure—Signs Other Important Acts.

Tuberculosis will be scientifically tested in Idaho in the future through the medium of two new tuberculosis hospitals, for Governor Davis this afternoon signed house bill No. 117, passed by the legislature, authorizing a tax levy to provide funds for their erection. He also signed the Star-Call road bill, appropriating \$45,000.

In signing this act, Governor Davis said: "I sign this bill with a keen sense of duty toward, and a deep feeling of sympathy for those afflicted with tuberculosis, and if by this act machinery can be put in motion to aid those now afflicted, control and prevent further infection, this state will have accomplished a deed in the interest of public welfare that will not be measured in dollars and cents, but will, I hope, be an everlasting blessing to all mankind."

OTHER MEASURES SIGNED. Other bills were signed, as follows: House bill 151—Appropriating \$200,000 for payment of part of cost of laying out and surveying and constructing a system of state highways.

House bill 152—Providing for the issuance and sale of state highway bonds to the value of \$900,000 to build highways.

Senate bill 82—Providing for an examination into the financial status of school districts, fixing powers and duties of school trustees and board of education.

House bill 26—Accepting provisions of vocational educational law known as Smith-Hughes act.

House bill 120—Appropriating \$100,000 to build a highway between Star and McCall.

Senate bill 134—Regulating the practice of dentistry and licensing dentists. Senate joint memorial No. 9—Memorializing congress to enact drastic laws for the prompt arrest, detention and punishment and deportation of all aliens who avoided the draft law and joined treasonable and seditious organizations of unpatriotic origin.

M. L. TWOGOOD BACK FROM SHIPYARD WORK

M. L. Twogood, former fire chief of Boise, who has been at work in the coast shipyards since last June, arrived home Thursday. Since last October he has been in the Sanders-Porters yard at Raymond, Wash., working with the joiners crew and continued work until last Monday when 300 men were let out because of the cancelling of another ship contract.

At the time Mr. Twogood went to work in the yard, 1600 men were employed there and the company had a contract for 15 ships. When the armistice was signed six had been completed and the contracts on five were immediately cancelled. Last Saturday, he states, the contract was cancelled on a ship which was 80 per cent done and on Monday the contract on another, 95 per cent completed, was cancelled and all but 120 men were released.

Mr. Twogood states he is glad to have been able to work in the shipyards and help as far as he could along that line but he was mighty glad to be back in Boise and away from the rains of the coast.

FURNITURE STORE MAKING UNIQUE IMPROVEMENTS

In order to show off to better advantage their spring shipment of high grade furniture, the Standard Furniture company is remodeling their lower floor by installing a complete suite of seven rooms, occupying about a third of the floor space, the suite consists of a kitchen, breakfast room, two bed rooms, living room, dining room and parlor.

Workmen and decorators are now at work in the store and will have the suite completed sometime next week. The rooms will be completely furnished, the same as in a home. While considerable expense will be involved in the improvement, the company feels it is justified with the increase of business.

COURT PROCEEDINGS.

DISTRICT COURT. Judgment for the plaintiff was given Thursday afternoon by Judge McCarthy in the case of the Eastside Against the State Board of Land Commissioners. The plaintiffs prayer for a writ of mandate requiring the defendants to auction off leases on certain state lands for grazing purposes and the court ordered that the writ be issued and lands auctioned.

TO IMPROVE HOTEL

Nampa, March 14—In order to care for its rapidly increasing patronage, Mayor Robert A. Davis, jr., proprietor of the Dewey Palace hotel, has decided to extend its east wing for the full three stories of the building, and plans for the proposed extension are now being drawn. There are to be three store rooms on the ground floor, four store rooms on the ground floor, four hotel rooms on the third floor.

The lower floor will be so constructed that entrance to the store rooms will be on the level with the street. The front and east sides of the extension are to be built of pressed brick with stone trimmings. The hotel is one of the best in the west and was erected by the late Col. W. H. Dewey at a cost of more than \$250,000.

WARNS WESTERN SOLONS TO KEEP EYE ON CAPITAL

(Capital News Special Service.) Washington, March 14—Senators McNary, Oregon; Jones and Poindexter, Washington; Borah of Idaho, and other Republican senators living a long way from the national capital have been warned by Senator Lodge, majority leader in the senate, that if they venture far from the District of Columbia they should keep in touch with him.

He points to the dire need of an extra session of congress and says that it cannot be foretold on what short notice President Wilson may decide to call congress together. Senator McNary has left the city for a few days, going to Birmingham, Ala., but in no event will he go back to Oregon before April 1. Senator Borah has a number of speaking engagements here in the east against the league of nations and after these are concluded he will survey the situation regarding an extra session before deciding on a trip to the Pacific coast in furtherance of the anti-league fight. Senators Jones and Poindexter have not determined now when they may start for home, if they decide to go west this spring.
