

# DOCTRINE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH TO BE TOLD THIS WEEK

**Paulist Fathers Conducting Mission Here Will Explain Teachings—Services Held at St. John's Cathedral.**

The closing services of the first week of the mission being conducted by the Paulist Fathers at St. John's cathedral will take place this afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, with the order of services as follows:

Recitation of the rosary; closing sermon; renewal of baptismal vows; reading of papal blessing; benediction of the blessed sacrament; blessing of articles of Catholic devotion and enrollment of members in confraternity of the scapular.

### A SOLEMN SERVICE

The renewal of the baptismal vows is a solemn service. To make the ceremony more impressive and memorable a symbolic baptismal font is erected inside the sanctuary. This font is equipped with everything connected with the administration of the sacrament of baptism. The top is draped in white and upon it rest a single candlestick and candle, recalling to mind the candle which is given to the Catholic at baptism with the admonition, "Receive this burning light and keep thy baptism without blame; observe the commandments of God, so that when our Lord shall come to His nuptials thou mayest meet Him and His saints in the heavenly courts and that thou mayest have life everlasting." The salt, symbolic of spiritual wisdom, the oil, symbolic of spiritual strength, the white robe, symbolic of purity of soul—all are there. In addition, the font is beautifully lighted and decorated with candles and flowers. When the time for the renewal of the baptismal vows has come the congregation solemnly avow their renunciation of Satan and all his works and pomps and profess their undying faith in Christ and their allegiance to Him.

The opening lecture of a series on Catholic doctrine will be given at 7:45 o'clock tonight, old time. The subject will be, "Does It Make Any Difference What We Believe?" Thereafter, continuing until Sunday evening, April 6, a lecture will be given each evening except Saturday.

### OUTLINES HISTORY

Speaking of the work of the Paulist Fathers and outlining the history of the organization, Rev. Guy F. Quinan, C. S. P., one of the missionary fathers, said:

"The course of doctrinal lectures to be given at St. John's cathedral this week will explain the teachings and doctrines of the Catholic church to all seekers after truth. A cordial invitation is extended to all who are not members of the Catholic communion to come and hear what the historic church of Christ has to say of herself and, it may be, to have difficulties explained which may tend to unite all in the 'unity of one faith, one baptism, one Lord and Master of us all.'"

"Our missionaries belong to the famous band of preachers known as the Congregation of St. Paul the Apostle (Paulists), who have been engaged for many years in giving missions and lectures from Maine to California and from Alaska to the Gulf of Mexico. In giving our lectures we assume as a basis that where there is antagonism to the Catholic church it does not necessarily arise from ill-will on the part of those who are not members of the church, but rather from misconceptions and misunderstandings of her teachings; that if there be seeming prejudice it is not a calculated and self-willed prejudice, but proceeds rather


I favor law enforcement and order and, if elected, will maintain an efficient and honest police department instructed to enforce all laws and ordinances impartially and without fear or favor.
