

# TRUE CHURCH OF CHRIST DISCUSSED BY PAULIST PRIEST

### Eloquent Sermon Given Tuesday Evening at St. John's Cathedral—Christ Established Church on Earth.

At St. John's cathedral Tuesday night Rev. Guy F. Quinan, C. S. P., of the Paulist missionary band of Portland, spoke to a goodly audience on the subject, "Which is the True Church of Christ?"

With eloquence and logic Father Quinan marshalled the facts which tended to show the establishment of a visible church by Christ and its existence in the world today.

In part the speaker said: "Did Christ establish a visible church on earth, and, if He did, which is the historic, the true church of Christ? The Catholic church claims that holy scripture proves that the Redeemer of mankind did establish a church on earth which since his advent has been visible to all the world, and to which he gave the positive command, 'Go, therefore, teach all nations, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and, lo, I am with you all days, even unto the end of the world.' The Catholic church teaches that according to holy scripture Christ said he would send to his church so established the Holy Spirit, to abide with the church forever; that though at times individual members of the church depart from ways of righteousness, nevertheless the church, as the divinely commissioned teacher of the truths of the Master, is today as it was in the days of the Apostles a marvel to the world as an example of unity, holiness, catholicity and apostolicity, and that these four qualities must of necessity be shown by any organization which claims to be the source from which all nations and all generations shall know what Christ taught and what He would have us believe and do.

#### CATHOLIC CHURCH RESPONSIVE

"By its unity of faith the Catholic church is responsive to the prayer of Jesus Christ, when He said, 'I pray that they may all be one as Thou, Father, in Me and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that Thou hast sent Me.' By the unbroken line of bishops at Rome, from St. Peter to Benedict XV, the apostolicity of the Catholic church is demonstrated. The Catholic church is spiritually a league of nations, and a general council of the church is literally a parliament of all mankind, Spanish, French, Italians, Irish, Poles, Austrians, Scotch, Americans, Germans and people of every other nation sitting in the central congress of the Catholic church. Catholics believe in a united Christendom and look upon the Catholic church as the fulfillment in the realm of religion of what, I dare say, most Americans today hope for in the realm

## FRAZIER BECOMES HEAD OF POCATELLO TECH INSTITUTE

Vocational Education Expert Named by State Board of Education to Succeed Late Miles Reed as President.

The state department of education announced the appointment of C. R. Frazier, federal director of vocational education of the state of Washington, headquarters Seattle, as president of the Idaho Technical Institute at Pocatello to succeed the late Miles F.

Reed, who died suddenly last fall. He will take over the southeastern Idaho Institution June 1.

Dr. Frazier was superintendent of schools in Everett, Wash., from 1910 to 1918. While there he established the strongest technical high school in the Pacific northwest. He is a deep student of all phases of vocational education. Prior to coming west he held a school superintendency in Minnesota. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and took post-graduate work at Chicago university and Yale. He is 45 years old, of excellent address, a fluent speaker and for four years was member of the state board of education in Washington.

## DRIED FRUIT FREIGHT RATE CASE IS LOST

### Reduction Sought From California Points to Boise Not Granted—Rate Asked Three Years Ago Not Needed Now.

The Boise Commercial club has lost its case against the Oregon Short Line to secure the same rate on dried fruit shipped in sacks from Fresno and other California points as is given on fruit shipped in boxes.

A telegram from Washington, D. C., this morning announced the decision of the interstate commerce commission against the club. Dried fruit shipped in sacks from California points to Boise has a freight rate of \$1.25 per hundred as against \$1 per hundred in boxes. The case was brought not only to compel the railroad to make a 25 cents reduction on the sack shipments, but discrimination as between Portland and Boise, was set out, for the reason that the rate from California points to Portland on both sacked and boxed fruit was the same.

The case was started three years ago and the hearing before the interstate commerce commission was held in Boise a year ago. It has since been under consideration by the commission.

George Graff, traffic manager of the Commercial club, was informed of the loss of the case in which he prepared the data and made the fight, which at the time it was started, meant thousands of dollars a year in saving to the wholesalers and retailers of Boise shipping in fruits.

#### BROWNS IN CIVIL WAR.

San Antonio, Texas, April 1.—Two squads of the St. Louis Browns will play daily practice games until the regulars take on the San Antonio Bronchos next Saturday. The first squad battle was staged yesterday. It was a 3 to 2 tie in seven innings.
