BOISE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS DEPARTMENT

Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock 30 cadets assembled at the high school building and led by Lieut.-Col. John H. Wall and Principal Dienst in uniform, marched in columns of twos to the gymnasium theatre, where seats had been reserved for them to observe the celebration of Constitution day.

Mr. Dienst called an assembly in the Boise high school Wednesday, for two reasons: to practice getting into the assembly by advisories, and to explain school policies. After reminding the students of the traffic regulations of the school—keeping to the right while passing through the halls and up and down steps he spoke of the hours of admission to the building in the morning, stating that those pupils arriving on the 7:45 car would be admitted to the building at 7:50 and that the rest of the pupils would not be admitted until 8:25 a. m.

COURT PROCEEDINGS

FEDERAL COURT.

George Carter, indicted by the grand jury on the charge of violating the Mann white slave act by transporting a young woman from Ontario to Boise for immoral purposes, pleaded guilty this morning. Judge Dietrich fixed Friday morning as the date for pronouncing sentence.

The case of William Brothers and L. L. Waller on the charge of operating an illicit still in Elmore county on Pattleslake creek, was set this morning by Judge Dietrich for Sept. 24.

Tom Lewis, who pleaded not guilty to robbing the post office at Fruitland and the one at Filer upon which he was indicted by the grand jury, will be tried Tuesday, Sept. 23.

Judge Dietrich is busy today with the final hearing in the case of the Twin Falls Canal company against Frank B. Damman, Mary Damman and Edwin Damman and W. G. Swenson, state engineer and commissioner of reclamation.

DISTRICT COURT.

Failure to reach an agreement after considering the issues over night, Judge McCarthy this morning dismissed the jury which has heard all the testimony in the damage suit of the Allen-Wright Furniture company against the Oregon Short Line.

JUSTICE COURT.

A compromise verdict was returned by the jury in the civil action in which E. L. Harrison was plaintiff and his brother, P. C. Harrison defendant, heard in Judge Rust's court Wednesday afternoon.

Dr. A. M. Jacobson, former president of the state dental board, was on the stand most of the afternoon Wednesday testifying in the preliminary examination of Dr. W. A. Myers, charged with bribery. Dr. Jacobson was called as a witness for the defense but was subjected to a long cross-examination by E. S. Delana, prosecuting attorney.

Skeleton Dug Up by Steam Shovel Along North and South Highway

Modern engineering and pioneer history came together last week on the North and South highway when the bones of an Indian fighter were unearthed by a steam shovel.

The skeleton of an unknown U. S. soldier, killed by Nezperce Indians in the battle of Whitebird on the morning of June 17, 1877, was dug up Tuesday on the old battle ground, near the Swartz place, on Whitebird hill, by a steam shovel excavating for the North and South highway.

"The skeleton was identified as that of one of General Perry's men by leather boots, which were found in the grave, and by a spur.

"Following the battle, in which thirty-three men, including a first lieutenant, under General Perry, was killed by the Indians, the bodies were buried in shallow graves. Afterward the bodies were exhumed and removed to Fort Lapwal, and it was thought that all the bodies buried on the battle ground had been taken up. Later they were removed from Fort Lapwal to the national cemetery at Walla Walla.

"Because of the haste with which the bodies of the soldiers were first buried, it is believed some of them lay in unmarked graves, and when the bodies were disinterred, it was impossible to find all the graves.

"Old-timers recall that, headed by eleven volunteers, two companies of U. S. cavalry, under Major Perry, sallied forth to meet the Indian warriors, numbering 325 under Chief Joseph. The volunteers, who were some distance ahead of the regulars, were repelled by the Indians, and when the cavalrymen saw the volunteers fall back they turned and fled.

CONFERENCE ON CONTRACT.

A conference on the kind of contract which purchasers of state land in the Gem Irrigation district next week will receive from the district, was held by members of the state land board with directors of the district this morning, following failure to reach an agreement Wednesday afternoon.

CALL FOR BRIDGE BIDS.

Bids on a steel bridge to be built across the Snake river at Homedale, under an appropriation by the 1917 legislature for five such bridges will be received by the state highway bureau October 1, Col. D. P. Olson, state highway director, said today. This bridge will open communications between some rapidly growing sections.

TO IMPROVE CROSSINGS.

The public utilities commission will co-operate with W. J. Hall, commissioner of public works, for improvement of thousands of railroad grade crossings in the state, it was announced today.

WOULD SELL WATER RIGHTS.

A petition for permission to sell water rights for 1,250 additional acres under the Mountain Home Co-operative Irrigation company's project was being heard late this afternoon by the state land board and W. G. Swenson, state reclamation commissioner. The petition was filed last spring but was not acted upon pending the outcome of a case in the district court covering points involved.

Water rights for 52,050 acres have already been sold by the company.
