

TOURISTS PRAISE FOREST RANGERS

Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Goldstein Home From Tour of Sawtooth and Challis Reserves—Roads Well Marked.

"When you get into the forest reserve you can't go wrong." That is the expression most used by automobile travelers who have come out of reserves and are being asked the direction and road to a certain place within the reserve, according to J. I. Goldstein of the Bannock Motor Sales company. Mr. and Mrs. Goldstein have just returned from an outing of more than a month during which they stopped at Halley, Guyer Hot Springs, Robinson Bar and toured the Challis and Sawtooth reserves.

Mr. Goldstein states he can now understand the popularity of Idaho's forest reserves to tourists as the forest rangers go out of their way to make visitors enjoy the reserves and have all roads plainly marked with all the information needed. He declared it is just as they tell you, "When you strike the forest reserve you can't go wrong." As an example of the road markings, Mr. Goldstein said, "The signs contain such information as the distance to prominent points and a hand indicates the route, the distance to the next stopping place, the location of the ranger station, the point where a telephone can be located, that first aid to the injured can be secured at the forest ranger station, etc., all the information needed, and in addition camping grounds have been arranged at various points equipped with tables, seats and other conveniences.

"The forest rangers put themselves out to do favors to tourists and all speak of their courtesy and generosity. For instance, a man a long distance from Halley broke a part of his machine. Through the forest ranger he got in touch with Halley on the forest telephone service, a mechanic was called to the phone and the part ordered and soon brought out. This service was given absolutely free, the man told me, and could not have been better had he been paying a handsome price for it."

Mr. and Mrs. Goldstein thoroughly enjoyed their trip in the mountains but are glad to get home as they began finding the weather pretty chilly the last week.

MONTANA POET HAS PRAISE FOR THE S. A.

Thomas Murray Spencer Writes Verse Telling of Larchmont Disaster When Workers Went Down With Ship.

Montana's poet, Thomas Murray Spencer, has the highest praise for the Salvation Army and its work. He is coming to Boise from Portland to be here fair week. He has written a poem dealing with the Larchmont disaster telling how 10 Scandinavian delegates of the army, Evangeline Booth, commander, enroute to a convention at Boston, knelt in prayer in a circle on the deck of that ill-fated ship on which 180 people lost their lives, went down with the boat. As it sank they sang, "Rock of Ages," giving encouragement to others. At the time the poem was written there were two organizations of Army Volunteers of America under Evangeline Booth. The incident proved an inspiration to Montana's poet. After the verse appeared it was published extensively in this and other countries.

The poem is as follows: I doubt if in the realms of light, A ray effulgent ever shown, On band as noble, pure and bright, As Larchmont's fated bark swept down. To those who've passed the veil of tears, And around the throne accepted are, Betwixt ye, have the passing years, Erought spirits brighter, braver far? It seems you must have stilled the voice of Heavenly Choir, And Angel's hearts with pity thrilled, As o'er the storm that song rose higher. I know not what your anthems be, If golden harps be ever strung, But Rock of Ages seems to me, A staff that all may lean upon.




