ORGANIZATIONS WILL CONFER ON HOW TO COMBAT DRUG EVIL

Mayor Eagleson Calls Meeting to Discuss Care of Addicts as Social Problem—Seattle Red Cross Plan Followed.

First steps toward organized effort to combat the narcotic drug evil in Idaho will be taken this evening at a conference called by Mayor Ernest G. Eagleson to be held in his office.

SEATTLE PLAN FOLLOWED. But the use of drugs is a wider social problem, to meet which the co-operation of city and state authorities and voluntary organizations is necessary.
