BULLETIN. Washington, Oct. 17.—Without a record vote the senate late today rejected the two remaining amendments to the peace treaty proposed by Senator Fall, New Mexico.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Defeat of the Shantung amendment means rejection of all textual amendments to the peace treaty, according to administration senators today.

Vote on the Shantung amendment did not come until after 6 o'clock yesterday evening. An attempt by Senator Lodge to obtain an earlier vote failed when Senator Borah of Idaho objected.

ROYAL COUPLE IN LOS ANGELES FOR FEW HOURS

King and Queen of Belgium Escorted Over Rose-strewn Path of Persian Rugs in Southern Pacific Station.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 17.—King Albert, Queen Elizabeth and the royal Belgian party were received by Southern California today.

Arriving at the Southern Pacific station at 9:30 o'clock, they were escorted over a rose-strewn path of Persian rugs to a dias which had been erected in the plaza and there Mayor Snyder of Los Angeles and Governor Stephens of California extended the official welcome and freedom of the city.

The king responded briefly. He thanked Los Angeles for what it had done in the Belgian relief work and expressed appreciation of the warm welcome Southern California had extended.

Petrograd Falls Into Hands Commander of Russian Northwestern Army While British Drive Reds From Kronstadt With Bombardment From Sea—Moscow in Danger of Falling—Fighting in Progress From White Sea to Caspian.

London, Oct. 17.—Petrograd has fallen to the forces of General Yudenitch, commander of the Russian Northwestern army, it was reported here today in advices from Helsingfors.

The reported capture of Petrograd was celebrated by Russians in Helsingfors, but there was no official confirmation of the fall.

General Yudenitch's forces captured Gatchina Tuesday night. Gatchina is 30 miles from Petrograd.

It is reliably reported from Reval, Copenhagen and Stockholm that Yudenitch has occupied Krainoye Selo and Tsarsko-Selo, 14 miles from Petrograd.

ARMY DISCIPLINE DISAPPEARS

At a meeting Oct. 6, according to Helsingfors advices, the Bolshevik leaders decided to evacuate Petrograd on account of lack of discipline in the army.

The British sea attack on Kronstadt, it is stated, was directed from Kuporia bay. Windows in Finnish villages were shattered by the concussion the bombardment caused.

NO SETTLEMENT MINERS' STRIKE AT NOON TODAY
