

## DELEGATES BEGIN ARRIVING FOR I. O. D. F. GRAND LODGE

Centennial Day Wednesday to Be Big Feature of Celebration—Mammoth Parade With Address at Methodist Church

### LINE OF MARCH GIVEN

Rebekah State Assembly Will Convene at Mosque—Department Council Patriarch Militant to Also Hold Session.

Odd Fellows and Rebekahs from all sections of Idaho began arriving in Boise this morning for the thirty-seventh annual session of the Grand lodge and the thirty-eighth annual session of the Rebekah assembly. Other sessions held in connection with the Grand lodge will be Grand Encampment of Idaho and the twelfth annual session of the Department Council, Patriarch Militant.

The outstanding feature of the session will be the Centennial celebration on Wednesday, the first event of which will be a mammoth Odd Fellows and Rebekah parade, which will leave the Odd Fellow temple at Ninth and Idaho streets, promptly at 2 p. m. The line of march will be from the temple north on Twelfth to State, thence to Main street, west on Main to Twelfth, north on Twelfth to State, thence to Tenth street, where the parade disbands and the Centennial ceremonies will be held at the First Methodist church, General Frank Martin, grand representative of Idaho, presiding. The address of the day will be made by Hon. Parley P. Christensen, past grand master and grand representative of Utah. At 7:30 p. m. the degree of Chivalry will be conferred on some 17 candidates at the Odd Fellows temple.

The Centennial celebration will close with a dance at the Mosque at Twelfth and Idaho streets.

**OPENING DAY.**  
On Monday at 10 a. m. the Grand Encampment will hold its opening session at the Odd Fellows temple. At the same hour the Rebekah State Assembly will convene at the Mosque at Twelfth and Idaho streets. In the evening at 7:30 the Department Council, Patriarch Militant, will meet. Following their session a public reception will be given.



## SNAKE RIVER SUSPENSION BRIDGE AT VILLAGE OF HANSEN SAID BE HIGHEST OF THAT TYPE IN THE UNITED STATES

Swings 345 Feet Above Canyon of Famous Stream—688 Feet in Length—Structure Is Realization of Dream of Judge Hansen Who Sat in Legislature Four Years Ago—He Was in First Auto to Cross During Grand Opening Celebration.

The new suspension bridge across the Snake river at the village of Hansen is the highest bridge of that type in America, if not in the world. It is claimed. The structure is 345 feet above the Snake river, the canyon of which it spans is 688 feet in length. It was four months in building. It was opened with an imposing ceremony recently, Governor Davis and other state officials being present.

The bridge sways and swings when a person walks over it, but it is perfectly safe. The engineer who supervised its construction says that every cable except one on either side could be removed and the bridge would still be quite safe.

### FAMOUS TENOR TO APPEAR IN CONCERT HERE ON FRIDAY

Theo Karle Has High Praise for Choir Boy Who Wishes to Grow Up Into a Singing Man—Has Fine Opportunity.

"There is nothing like a church choir for the boy who wishes to grow up into a singing man, or any other kind of a man" says the well-trained young athlete Theo Karle, whose beautiful tenor voice has been the envy of many a choirmaster in New York and other American cities. Music lovers of Boise will have an opportunity of seeing the personal application of Mr. Karle's theory next Friday evening, Oct. 24, when he sings here en route to the coast.

"To my mind, there is no boy who is not immeasurably richer in every way for the training afforded by the modern church choir. Let us take the four phases of his life, remembering that on entering the choir the boy represents "raw material" in what is probably the ideal condition for training, that is, the plastic stage of mind and body and voice.

"If the church be well ordered and established he is "taken over" from his parents care and subjected to a rigid discipline. Discipline is one of the finest things in the world and applied authority with perfect obedience is the sure road to self discipline in later life. His simple physical needs are properly cared for. He is taught and helped to grow up straight physically, and he grows up with a knowledge of the great music of the church, a growing love for the ecclesiastic form of music, and a training in sight reading and good singing. His mind grows and improves, as does his young body, into a beautiful thing.

"For recreation there is the choir baseball, tennis and swimming clubs, and he is taught that he is a young gentleman associating with gentlemen, and that a sense of fairness and justice in play and work is necessary."

"The growth of his musical education comes the fellowship with a group of gentlemanly lads under the control of a competent choirmaster, and if he has a leaning for "paper work" he may even compose or assist on the organ in case of need. His moral character is usually subjected to rigid discipline and his mental habits are schooled in the proper channels.

"A choir boy has opportunity to grow up into a useful and very entertaining member of society that the "other boy" might well envy, and in those churches where salaries are paid to the boys, in addition to their training and boarding, the boy leaves his choirmaster often with a little fund of money to his credit, as well as a training in matters physical, mental and musical the value of which cannot be overestimated.

"I have only spoken of these qualities up to now, but the greatest training he can possibly have, and the greatest asset in his later life, is the quality of spirituality and reverence. If the boy intends to become an artist he will find that the development and education of his spiritual qualities in the church choir, quite apart from all his other training, are perhaps his most precious possession.

"And there is far too little spirituality in this hurrying, material world," said the young tenor reflectively, "even among artists, I regret to say. And that is why I am strong for the old church choir for boys"

## ASKS 11 GOVERNORS TO COOPERATE IN BIG IRRIGATION MEETING

Idaho Executive Calls Reclamation Congress at Salt Lake Nov. 21-22 to Discuss Common Problems.

Formal letters setting forth the purposes of the irrigation congress called by Governor Davis to be held Nov. 21 and 22 at Salt Lake were mailed out Saturday from the governor's office to governors of the western states which Governor Davis proposes to organize into a gigantic reclamation affiliation for the purpose of promoting matters of common interest.

"For a long time there has been a feeling among all of us I am sure that the most certain way for the states where irrigation is practiced to present a solid front and get results would be the solidifying of our activities toward these results," said Governor Davis' letters.

**IDAHO TAKES LEAD.**  
"Idaho is experiencing the greatest public demand for the reclamation of lands since its statehood. This I be-

lieve has been brought about not only by the high prices of land in the east but more particularly because our people have had brought to their attention the wrong that we are doing ourselves in allowing waste waters to flow into the Pacific while we still have hundreds of thousands of acres of land susceptible to irrigation.

"You know as well as I the difficulties we have faced in the past in getting financial assistance both private and public and in doing the real constructive work which we all know should be done. The same condition exists in all the western states. We have never been together in our demands and I think the time is here when we should present a solid front in our fight for action."

The letters were addressed to governors of the following states: California, Colorado, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming and Arizona. With Idaho, 12 states will be represented at the congress with 10 delegates each.

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
