

ODD FELLOWSHIP HISTORY REVIEWED BY ABLE SPEAKERS

General Frank Martin and Judge J. F. Ailshie Tell of the Growth and Achievements of Order.

DECORATION OF CHIVALRY

Twelve Rebekahs and Three Odd Fellows Given Badges of Honor—Centennial Closes With Dance.

Starting with the organization of Washington lodge No. 1 at Baltimore 100 years ago, General Frank Martin, Part Grand master of the I. O. O. F. of Idaho and grand representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, recounted the remarkable growth and achievements of the order Wednesday afternoon before a large audience at the First Methodist church.

The gathering of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs at the church formed the second link in the centennial celebration. Their ceremonies opened with a prayer by Rev. Thomas O. Grieves, a solo by J. W. Thrallkill, an organ recital by Mrs. Laugel Elam and several selections by the Boise Male quartet.

General Frank Martin, presiding officer, spoke of the significance of the gathering and briefly gave an interesting outline of the history of Odd Fellowship and the Rebekahs. The order, founded upon Friendship, Love and Truth, the speaker stated, had attained a membership of 2,250,000, and grand lodges in 68 jurisdictions. General Martin also recited that the order was spending an average of \$7,000,000 annually for relief for its members and humanity in distress. He noted that in Idaho the Odd Fellow lodges had led all other fraternal organizations in the purchase of War Savings Stamps and had taken an active part in all war activities. He spoke with pride of the 51 Odd Fellow homes in the United States in which the orphans of members were reared and educated and aged Odd Fellows given comfortable homes in their declining days.

Judge Ailshie confined his address to the achievements of the order and its benefit to mankind and gave an outline of its program to fraternalize the world. He pointed out that while many organizations exist, few have had failed. Odd Fellowship had stood the test of 100 years and was today upon a firmer foundation than ever with a membership of sturdy men of the middle classes who accepted the responsibilities of the nation and found time to join an order for the uplift and aid of their fellowman.

Judge Ailshie concluded by urging that all possible aid be given by Odd Fellows in the reconstruction of the world and urged them all to have confidence that the day was not far distant for universal brotherhood.

FORUM DEBATING SOCIETY. The members of the Forum Debating society of the high school held their first regular meeting Wednesday morning during the third period. Frank Minas, the president, presided. Mr. Minas made a few remarks concerning the spirit in the Forum and congratulated the students on their organization. Glenn Perkins, principal of the Pocatello high school, is very anxious to see Boise, Pocatello and Twin Falls enter into a triangular debate. It is open for the Forum to decide.

Prof. Bronson, history teacher of the high school, gave a few hints on public speaking and showed how the Forum would be helped along this line.

Karen Kleidsen, the vice-president, gave a short talk on the Roosevelt memorial, discussing the three principal objects. Sam Poindexter, the secretary and treasurer, told what the Forum had meant to him. Francis Mannville, a member of the executive committee gave an interesting talk on the history and progress of aviation.

Miss Barnes, the expression teacher of the high school and faculty advisor of the Forum, outlined the work for the coming year.

The last 15 minutes were devoted to open forum discussion by all the members.

GOVERNOR ADDRESSES STUDENTS. Governor D. W. Davis was the speaker at an assembly held Wednesday afternoon at the high school.

The students felt they were especially honored not only to have the governor visit the school and speak to them, but also to have him present the warrants to all the officers in the R. O. T. C.

Governor Davis urged the students to assume the full responsibility of citizenship, to think for themselves and

not to "follow the crowd." "And we may be sure," said Governor Davis, "that when the American people do think for themselves, the verdict will be right."

Governor Davis next spoke of the menace of disloyalty in our country at the present time and explained that it is largely due to people who are not American citizens. He assured the students we should heartily welcome immigrants, but that we should reserve the right to demand of them, in a reasonable length of time, the oath of allegiance to the constitution, or send them back.

The governor hoped the students would use good common sense during this "carnival of extravagance," as he termed it, not only from the standpoint of saving their money but also with a view of establishing good habits and standards.

The speaker urged the students to pay some attention to the constitution of the United States, and said it was the best document ever put together. He asked them to guard and protect it, remembering that it grants to each, rights that no other people have and that it has stood the test of time.

At the close of his address, Governor Davis complimented the high school on their excellent R. O. T.
