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BREEDERS' ASSN. TO HOLD AUCTION SALE IN CALDWELL NOV. 6

Fifty Head Purebred Short-horns Will Be Offered in the Yards of Caldwell Sale and Commission Company.

Caldwell, Oct. 25.—The first fall auction sale of the Boise Valley Short-horn Breeders' association is scheduled to be held in this city at the yards of the Caldwell Sale and Commission company Thursday, Nov. 6, and the offerings will consist of 50 head of purebred Short-horns. The cattle have been inspected by the association's board of inspectors, thereby assuring all interested of their high character. Among the consignment there are pure Scotch bulls and heifers that will no doubt sell in the ring at the highest prices ever sold in this section of the Northwest, as their breeding is direct from the families of Short-horns that are selling in the eastern sale yards at prices ranging in the thousands.

There will be cows with calves by their side, bred by pure Scotch bulls costing \$2000 one and two years ago, that today such bred sires could not be bought at double the original price.

In fact, the majority of the breeders consigning to this sale are owners of high class Scotch bulls, which is an absolute insurance that the young cattle offered will surpass any Short-horn sale ever held in this valley. The cattle listed run from calves to aged cows and bulls.

The association is determined to make this, as well as all of their sales they conduct, a credit to the breed, and they believe credit to themselves and profitable investment to the purchaser.
