

LABOR SITUATION VIEWED SERIOUSLY BY JUDGE LOVETT

President of Union Pacific and Chairman of the Executive Board Visit Boise With Party of Other Officials.

ON TRIP OF INSPECTION

Needed Improvements to Oregon Short Line in Rapidly Developing Territory Likely to Be Made.

The present labor situation in the United States is viewed with all seriousness by Judge R. S. Lovett, president of the Union Pacific railroad and chairman of the executive board of that system which includes as one of its principal subsidiary lines, the Oregon Short Line. Judge Lovett was in Boise for a short time this morning, accompanied by a number of other prominent officials. Mrs. Lovett is traveling with her husband. The party arrived on a special train coming to Idaho from Butte and left at noon for points west, intending to go to the coast.

NOTE DEVELOPMENT.

Its main purpose of the trip is to inspect the Union Pacific system, to take an estimate of the rapidly developing territory. It was learned from members of the party that they are paying particular attention to this because the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line officials realize that to care for the tonnage from these districts there must be additional feeding lines built. This is particularly true of the Oregon Short Line territory they said. It is understood that as soon as the government turns back the railroads to their owners this prospective building program of the Short Line will be earnestly taken up and ample transportation facilities provided.

"Southern Idaho is developing very rapidly," said one of the members of the party. "In fact it has reached the stage where to handle the freight tonnage we must build and provide more ample facilities. I realize that and I believe all of the officials of our party do."

INTERESTED IN SITUATION.

Judge Lovett was greatly interested in news about the coal strike. When seen by a representative of the Capital News he anxiously asked about the latest news from Washington regarding it.

"The labor situation is such that there must be a show down," said Judge Lovett. "I want to know myself whether we are to have a soviet or not. It is certainly one of the most serious situations that has ever confronted the United States."

Just before noon a large number of business men of Boise gathered in the Owyhee hotel lobby and met Judge Lovett and party. An informal reception was held after which the officials left for their special train.

POSITIVE EVIDENCE THAT TWO AVIATORS WERE MURDERED

Washington, Oct. 28.—Positive evidence that two Mexican fishermen murdered Lieutenants C. H. Connelly, San Diego, and F. B. Waterhouse, Boise, Idaho, army flyers whose bodies were recently found along the Mexican coast just south of the California boundary line, is in the hands of the war department, it was officially stated today.

UNCOVERS ALLEGED PLOT TO KIDNAP THE SON OF HENRY FORD

Toledo, Ohio, Oct. 28.—A plot to kidnap Edsel Ford, son of Henry Ford, millionaire automobile manufacturer of Detroit, was frustrated here with the arrest of four men, police were told today.

The alleged conspiracy was exposed by Floyd Gray, who said he was a private detective and posed as an ex-convict to get in the confidence of the men and join in the undertaking. Gray told the police that a bell-boy in a Detroit hotel hatched the plot. It was intended to drug young Ford and hold him for \$200,000 ransom.

The four men arrested in a local rooming house today gave their names as Edward Kenney, Detroit; Richard Ramsey and Claude "Slim" Cameron of New York, and Joseph Fisher of San Francisco.

Police are investigating Gray's story.
