

LIBERTY BOND MARKET IS FEATURE TODAY ON BOARD OF TRADE

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Reports that the market situation was somewhat improved and that dealers getting rid of their grain was the cause of a somewhat choppy market on the Chicago board of trade today. Provisions were lower on higher hog receipts.

December corn opened one down at 33 1/2, and later trading gained 1/4. January corn opened 1 1/2 down at 13 1/2 and remained unchanged. May corn opened two down at 13 1/2, lost another 1/4 in later trading.

December oats opened 1/2 down at 72, lost another 1/4 before the close. May oats, down 1/4 at opening of 75 1/2, slipped another 1/4 later.

During the fourth hour, prices continued downward. Some stocks acted better than others, however. Crucible rallied 10 points on the day's low. General Motors after an early low at 288 sold up to 297 and then lost half of the recovery.

New York, Nov. 6.—The stock market opened irregular today. United States Steel opened at 109 1/2, off 1/4. Marine at 61 off 1/4. Studebaker 130 1/2 off 1/4.

Most of the industrials were soft during the second hour, but several rails were taken in large blocks at advancing prices. Southern Pacific sold at 110 1/2, up 1/4.

Some rather sharp declines were recorded during the second hour with the principal pressure on steels and equipments. Crucible declined 15 points to 225.

Commander Running was director of the 38th field artillery band at Camp Lewis for six months. Officers Turner and Green saw overseas service and Adjutant Bradbury was in the tank corps. The post will stage a program on Nov. 11, armistice day.

Two road projects within the district are now well under way. The portion of the main north and south highway passing through the district from Moscow to Potlatch has been surveyed and federal aid applied for. \$300,000. The object is to pay for the cost of construction, improvement and repair of the roads within the highway district, and for the purchase of machinery and equipment for road maintenance work.

The Heyburn park branch of the state department of public works to run north from Potlatch up Deep creek to Heyburn park, Lake Chatochee, and thence up the west side of Coeur d'Alene. Beside serving a great economic need by opening up the Coeur d'Alene Indian reservation it renders a number of accessible some of the best fishing, hunting and recreational grounds in the northern part of the state.

Beside the completion of these portions of the state highway system the commissioners of the district plan on the improvement of the three routes running east and west through the district to Palouse, Cascade and Farmington, Wash., thereby linking up with the Washington highways. For this improvement work a tractor and engine grader have been purchased.

The Potlatch high district embraces over 72,000 acres in the northwestern part of Latah county, the assessed valuation of which is approximately \$4,000,000. Ninety-five per cent of this territory is well improved Palouse farm land which accounts for the large valuation. It also embodies the extensive Potlatch operations of the Potlatch Lumber company, representing a valuation of over a million and a half.
