SOMEBODY DUE FOR FOOTBALL SMASHUP ON EASTERN FIELDS

Syracuse and Brown May Make Colgate and Dartmouth Look Sick—Yale and Princeton Hold Center of Stage.

New York, Nov. 14.—Like that noted water pitcher of old, the monarchs of the gridiron go again to the football well tomorrow. For at least two of the eleven—Colgate and Dartmouth—who make their weekly trip of hazard on the slippery rocks, it may be that proverbial "once too often" journey. Syracuse and Brown look to have the best chance of the season to twist the wrists of the championship hands and split two of the season's best on the already large pile of wrecks at the well. Yale and Princeton get the center of the spotlight. That battle in the New Haven game may not be the best of the day of big games, but it is Yale-Princeton play and it will get the call from the sport aristocrats. Battles of far more importance will be waged between Colgate and Syracuse, Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania, and Dartmouth and Brown.

WANTS HALF MILLION TO PREPARE BRITONS FOR OLYMPIC GAMES

New York, Nov. 13.—Great Britain is seeking a big fund to train a team for the Olympic games next year in Belgium. Lieutenant Colonel A. S. Jackson, president of the Oxford University club, was reported in a recent interview to have asked for a fund of \$500,000 to provide training grounds, secure competent trainers and pay the expenses of the athletes that will carry the British colors in the renewal of the big world games.

IDAHO UNIVERSITY WILL MEET GONZAGA

Fast Gridiron Contest Expected at Spokane Saturday—South Idaho Students Prominent in Line-up.

University of Idaho, Moscow, Nov. 14.—Strenuously has characterized Idaho football practice of the past two afternoons and the work of the coming three days is expected to be quite as violent. Coach Hutchinson having decided to leave no stone unturned in his preparation for a game with the speedy Gonzaga eleven to be played in Spokane Saturday.

Idaho displayed offensive power and marked defensive strength in last Saturday's contest with Montana university, registering 12 first down while the Bruins were making yardage only twice, but local enthusiasts were dissatisfied because the variety eleven ran through its plays sluggishly. If Captain Breshears had speeded up his team either in the second or fourth quarters, at least two additional touchdowns would have been scored.

It's Tim's last year. Next year I can root for Mike," she said.

The general resolution of the Rotarians reads as follows: "Whereas, on Armistice Day, at Centralia, Wash., the members of the local post of the American Legion under the extreme provocation to participate in mob violence to avenge their murdered comrades stood squarely for law enforcement and proved themselves thoroughly imbued with the American idea of extending even-handed justice to everyone charged with serious crime; although the proof of guilt was seemingly convincing; Be it resolved by the Boise Rotary club, that we commend their stand and express the confidence and belief that under similar circumstances the ex-service men in Boise and everywhere would show the same high type of Americanism."

MAKE OVERTURE FOR PARLEY WITH MAJORS

Minor Leagues Name Committee to Arbitrate Return to Old Relations Between Baseball Organizations.

Springfield, Mass., Nov. 14.—Settlement of the war between the minor and major leagues is now up to the "Big fellows," the minor magnates said here today following the annual meeting of the minor associations. By the appointment of a committee to work with the majors in drawing up a new agreement, leaders claim the next step was put up to the two major leagues and the national commission. They predicted a quick settlement as soon as a meeting is called, as with few exceptions the minors favor a return to the draft, optional agreement and all the old working arrangements.

PROMOTERS EAGER TO STAGE JIMMY WILDE

Joe Lynch Wants Real Money if He Meets British Champ—Visitor May Not Fight in the East Before February.

New York, Nov. 13.—Promoters are walking on each other trying to land the privilege of introducing the British flyweight champion, Jimmy Wilde, to American fans.

Dave Mac Kay, who made the recent unsuccessful attempt to get Jack Dempsey back in the ring, offered Joe Lynch \$5,000 to meet Wilde in an eight-round bout in Newark early in the year. Lynch declined, with a demand for \$15,000.

Boys east of Chicago before he opens the new International Sporting club February 3 are considered unlikely for the champion, as he is said to be under contract with Tex Rickard not to appear in the east until he has helped launch the new club.

BOOST LARRY DOYLE TO MANAGE PIRATES

New York, Nov. 14.—Larry Doyle, "former" second baseman of the Giants, is the latest candidate to be pushed for the manager's job at Pittsburgh.
