FOR ROOSEVELT MEMORIAL.

MAY SETTLE WATER CASE.

E. M. Sweeley of the public utilities commission, has wired from Harrison that the hearing of the case started by Harrison village officials against the Harrison Waterworks company to compel the company to furnish better water for domestic purposes, has been postponed pending probable private settlement.

CONTINUE TOLL RATES.

An order was issued Saturday by the public utilities commission permitting the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company, operating extensively in north Idaho, to continue the toll rates established while the lines were under government control, until a hearing can be held to determine the justification for continuing the rates.

START FORECLOSURE.

Foreclosure proceedings to clear up indebtedness to the state on three farm loans were instituted yesterday by the state department of public investments, which has charge of such collections. The defendants and the amount of their respective loans and the date of the last payments on accounts were: Fred H. Bradbury and wife, Rathdrum, August, 1913, \$2000; Rachel A. McFarland and husband, Boise, December, 1915, \$2000; J. Roy Ayers and wife, Boundary county, December, 1915, \$1000.

May L. Headrick was granted a divorce Saturday from Warren C. Headrick on the grounds of cruelty. She is given the custody of the minor children. In the case of Jack Montagne charged with forgery, the petition of the prosecuting attorney to endorse additional names on the complaint, was granted.

This information today indicated the leaders of the new movement were identified with a similar attempt several years ago among employees of the Pennsylvania railroad, which was thwarted by the Brotherhood.

FREIGHT TRAINS ARE RUNNING OVER OLD KANSAS CITY ROAD

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 15.—Freight trains were being operated today over the Kansas City Northwestern railroad between Kansas City and Virginia, Nebraska. Passenger service has not yet been resumed. It was stated at the office of the railroad here. The present service is to "clean up" old freight, it was stated.

WAGE INCREASES ARE GIVEN EMPLOYEES OF PORTLAND CAR LINES

Portland, Ore., Nov. 15.—Street railway employes have been awarded wage increases by the board of arbitration which considered their demands. The platform men are to receive a maximum of 45 cents an hour instead of their present 45.

\$250,000 FIRE AT OREGON CITY SATURDAY

Oregon City, Ore., Nov. 15.—A loss of at least \$250,000 was caused by an early morning fire which started in the basement of the Methodist Episcopal church building. The church structure was practically destroyed, as was the W. O. W. building adjoining.

BOYCOTT ON RADICALS BY CIVIL ENGINEERS

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 15.—Members of the Spokane chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the associated engineers last night ordered a boycott on all radicals and I. W. W. and will employ no more on any jobs. Both societies passed resolutions demanding the enforcement of laws against radicals, untrammelled by legal technicalities.
