

HITCHCOCK PREDICTS PEACE TREATY WILL BE RATIFIED

Principals In Coal Strike Fail To Reach Agreement

MINERS WILL ACCEPT COMPROMISE PROPOSAL MADE BY SECRETARY LABOR WILSON ON WAGE SCALE BUT OPERATORS DECLARE IT PARTISAN

Under New Plan Miners Will Be Granted Average Increase of 31.61 Per Cent—President of Owners' Association Says 20 Per Cent Is Limit Operators Are Willing to Go—Miners' Head Also Seeks Shorter Hours.

By RALPH F. COUCH, United Press Staff Correspondent. Washington, Nov. 22.—Coal operators tonight characterized as "absolutely partisan" the proposal to compromise their wage scale differences with 400,000 striking miners made by Labor Secretary Wilson.

"We'll accept the proposal and settle on that basis as far as it concerns wages," said President John Lewis of the United Mine Workers' union.

SECRETARY'S PROPOSAL. Secretary Wilson proposed that the wage controversy be settled by granting the miners an average increase of 31.61 per cent. This increase, according to an official announcement made late today by the secretary, represents the exact wage needed to make the miners' pay conform to the increased cost of living.

"Our offer of a 20 per cent increase which the miners voted down represented the limit the operators are willing to go," said President Thomas T. Brewster of the central competitive field operators' association tonight.

Operators said today they did not feel that Secretary Wilson represented the feeling of the majority of the government when he made the com-

Finds World Dazzling After 18 Years, 3 Months in Prison

COAL SHORTAGE CAUSES PLANTS TO SHUT DOWN

Serious Situation Faced by the Middle West—300 Civil War Veterans in Critical Condition at Danville.

Chicago, Nov. 22.—The middle west had reached the bottom of its coal bin tonight. Ships and industrial plants were reported closed and public utilities were operating far below normal throughout the soft coal consuming region.

FOUR-DAY SUPPLY. Madden said Danville had a four-day supply of coal with which to operate the central heating plant. It supplies the national soldiers' home.

Washington, Nov. 22.—Charging Senator Lodge with "thinking more of politics than of patriotism," Senator Hitchcock today made known the intention of administration forces in the senate to make a new attempt for treaty ratification at the regular session of congress which meets Dec. 1.

Hitchcock's statement was in reply to Lodge who said he would welcome the treaty as an issue.

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MEMORIAL COMMISSION SELECTS FAIRBANKS SOLDIER MODEL WITH IDAHO FACES AS STATE EMBLEM

Designed by Salt Lake Sculptor, Avard Fairbanks—Action Clears Way for Counties to Proceed With Erection of Memorials to Their Soldier Dead—Available in Two Forms, Free Standing Figure or in Relief.

The Fairbanks model of the American soldier, as designed and submitted by Avard Fairbanks, the Salt Lake sculptor, was adopted late yesterday afternoon by the state memorial commission as the official emblem for Idaho's memorial to the soldiers, sailors and marines who lost their lives in the late war with Germany and her allies.

SOLDIERS HONORED. The commission decided to make the model as typically Idahoan as possible and the heads and faces will be modeled after three Idaho soldiers, the late Lieutenant John H. Regan, Private Neibauer of Sugar City and Sergeant Charles A. Turner of Grangeville.

REVOLUTION OF ENTIRE WORLD LENINE'S PLAN

Document Captured in Switzerland Lays Bare Plans of Bolsheviks for Final Supreme Effort This Winter.

Paris, Nov. 22.—Details of plans by Lenin and Trotsky for a final supreme effort to bring about an international revolution this winter involving attempts on the lives of rulers of "bourgeois" governments as well as destruction of railroads, mines and ships and general strikes have just been revealed in a document captured in Switzerland.

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Lieutenant Regan gave his life to his country on the battlefield of France and lies buried there. Private Neibauer is the only soldier from Idaho and one of the few in the nation to receive the congressional medal for bravery on the battlefield. He captured a machine gun nest out of commission. Sergeant Turner is now at Grangeville and saw active service. He is considered one of the finest soldiers, physically, sent to the front from this state.
