

OFFICERS STILL SILENT ON THE DANZY MURDER

Prominent Florist of Hammon-ton Remains in County Jail on Charge Murder—House-keeper Also Under Arrest.

Hammon-ton, N. J., Dec. 10.—County officials continued reticent today regarding the evidence which purports to connect Charles S. White and Mrs. Edith Jones with the alleged murder of little Billy Danzy. White's father, Edward H. White, however, shed some light on the theory apparently held by the officers.

The elder White rode from Atlantic City to Mays Landing last night with John P. Wilson, chief of county detectives. White later told reporters of his conversation with Wilson.

"My son has been locked up on the theory and a lot of rot," White said. "Detective Wilson rode over on the train with me from Atlantic City. I guess he was after information but he gave me a little."

FATHER'S STORY

"I'll tell you what he told me. You can take it for what it's worth. He said they had evidence that Charley started to chase the Danzy boy or maybe the boy's dog Jack out of the back field and had injured the boy. It seems ridiculous to say that Charley would pick up a stone and throw it at a baby when he himself is the father of a baby—Little Charley, Jr., but that's what they say. I don't want to be too positive about the stone. Anyway, he said Charley had hit the boy with something and finding the child was badly hurt, carried his somewhere, into the house I believe. That's why they arrested Mrs. Jones, he told me. He said they found evidence of first aid on the baby's skeleton. The detective said Mrs. Jones tried to doctor the baby."

Wilson also asked me about the boxes in which they ship dahlias to New York. They are three and a half feet long and about 14 inches deep. He hinted that a little boy's body could easily be concealed in one of them. I asked Charley if he told him he could have a lawyer and he said they didn't tell him anything except that things had better be rushed so that they could get him out of Hammon-ton. My son is taking the whole thing a lot more coolly than I am."

When told what the elder White had said, Wilson declared:

DENIES REMARKS

"I didn't tell the old man a thing. I'm not telling anybody but Mr. Caskill (Edmund C. Caskill, prosecuting attorney)."

Caskill said "You don't want to forget that Billy Danzy's dog was shot about two weeks before the boy disappeared. The day Billy disappeared was the first time the dog had been out of the house since he was shot. Charley Whit was asked at the inquest if he had shot the dog to drive it out of the dahlias. Caskill said the boy's body was hidden somewhere and reduced to a skeleton between October 8 when disappeared and November 21, when the remains were found in a swamp three miles from the Danzy home in Hammon-ton. He emphasized that the clothing which was scattered near the body plainly showed it had been exposed but a few days.

BUHL IS HARD HIT BY COAL SHORTAGE; FAMILIES IN NEED

Tanner, Former Boise Newspaper Man, Takes Charge as Fuel Administrator and Able to Give Relief.

(Capital News Special Service). Buhl, Dec. 10.—One hundred and fifty families are without coal and the supply is completely exhausted among the dealers, making a situation which has never been paralleled in Buhl.

Joseph W. Tanner has been appointed fuel administrator and has complete charge of the situation. His office is being besieged by hundreds of people who are demanding immediate relief for their wives and children.

Administrator Tanner is making a canvass of the homes in an effort to find out how much coal is stored. If an excessive amount is found on hand then an effort will be made to redistribute the supply among the most needy families.

Under the system inaugurated by Administrator Tanner no permits for coal are issued until the coal is actually received in town and ready for distribution. The fuel is being distributed first come first served as long as the supply lasts.

It is stated by Administrator Tanner that no relief is in sight and that it will require several weeks to adjust conditions here even though the strike should terminate this week.

EMMETT PUTS BAN ON CIGARETS FOR BOYS UNDER AGE

Emmett, Dec. 10.—The Emmett city council has decided to enforce the stringent city ordinance already on the statute books, against cigaret smoking by all boys under 21 years of age. The ordinance provides a penalty in any sum not to exceed \$100. The police have been instructed to strictly enforce this statute.

EMMETT HAS SCHOOL NURSE

The Emmett school board has appointed Miss Minnie Pipper as school nurse during the present epidemic of contagious diseases prevailing here. Every pupil attending the schools here must submit to an examination by the nurse. It is hoped by this method to prevent the further spread of the diseases.

TULSA, OKLA., IS THREATENED BY SEVERE BLAZE

One Entire Block Burning and Still Out of Control at 7:30 o'Clock This Morning—Cold Handicaps.

Tulsa, Okla., Dec. 10.—Tulsa's business district was threatened today by fire which spread over an entire block between Third and Fourth streets on Main.

The fire started at 3 a. m. and was believed to be due to a sudden increase in gas pressure which caused burners to flare up. With flames still out of control at 7:30 a. m., there was no estimate of damage. Firemen were handicapped in their battle by extreme cold.

Eleven alarms were turned in during the night. One lumber yard with a large stock was burned to the ground, the fire department being unable to divert fighters from the main business district.
