

### CRITICISM SELECTION OF SOLDIER MEMORIAL

**Mrs. Green, Member of State Commission, Says Desire Is to Please People—Mothers Enter Objections.**

When asked regarding a report that many Idaho mothers of soldier boys who sacrificed their lives for their country had spoken strongly against the idea of a personal instead of a general type of face being selected for the soldiers' memorial statue, Mrs. J. G. Green, the Boise member of the commission said:

"It is true that a bitter protest is being voiced from a number of the mothers of Idaho soldiers who lost their lives in the service of their country against the adoption by the state memorial commission of any personal type of face to be used in moulding the model of the American soldier selected by that body.

**MOTHERS OBJECT.**  
The mothers feel that the living soldiers have received recognition and reward from the government and the approval of their friends.

"The mothers argue that there should be a general type embodying the features of strength, of rugged characteristics. They bitterly resent placing on a pedestal of fame either one or three types when hundreds of Idaho sons sacrificed their lives for their country.

"Many protests are coming in, each one seemingly more bitter than the other. I think I may state for the commission that it desires only to meet the will of the majority. That whatever the people desire is their wish. And surely the Idaho mother who is left utterly alone has suffered the greatest bereavement the world can know."

### 1000 MORE WESTERN BOYS BACK FROM WAR

**Steamer Powhatan Expected to Arrive at Hoboken, N. J., This Week, According to Cable From Brest.**

According to a cablegram received from the executive office of the United States army port at Brest, France, by the Rocky Mountain club, the transport Powhatan, with nearly 1000 soldiers, many from the west, will arrive this week at Hoboken, N. J. Among the units on board the ship are: Brest casual companies No. 8725, 1 officer, 132 men; No. 8727, 1 officer, 53 men; No. 8728, 1 officer, 143 men; No. 8729, 1 officer, 155 men; No. 8730, 1 officer, 121 men; motor truck companies No. 422, 1 officer, 37 men, and No. 435, 1 officer, 41 men; a medical detachment with 3 officers and 120 men. Also on board are twelve casual officers, two army field clerks, one nurse, three Y. W. C. A. workers, 27 prisoners and nearly a score of French wives of Mr. Buck Private, U. S. A. The destination of most of the men on board, according to officials at Hoboken, is Camp Dix, N. J. During the war it is estimated that the Rocky Mountain club gave actual assistance of some kind or other, whether filling some small need of a boy in a hospital, conducting sight-seeing trips in New York or establishing communication between soldiers and relatives to more than 150,000 members of fighting forces. The club is still "on the job" and has made arrangements for publication in western newspapers, news of transport schedules, and upon arrival, a full list of western soldiers on board. The club wishes it known that it is completely at the service of relatives or friends who wish something done or western soldiers while they are in the east. General Pershing has recently commended the work of the club in caring for western soldiers, saying: "You are to be congratulated upon the good work you have accomplished, and I hold it an honor to be included in your membership."

**MINNESOTA WILL PRESENT WINTER**  
The name of Mrs. Thomas G. Winter as a nominee for the office of president of the General Federation of Women's clubs will be presented by the Minnesota delegation at the biennial convention of the organization at Des Moines next June. This action will be taken in accordance with the unanimous vote of the Minnesota delegates at their annual state convention held recently.

Mrs. Winter is now serving her fourth year as a member of the executive board of the general federation, serving first for two years as a director and is now on her second year as second vice president. Previous to this she served as chairman of the department of literature for four years. In addition to the national offices she has held, Mrs. Winter served two terms as president of the Minnesota State Federation of Women's clubs and also as president of the Minneapolis Women's club. During the war she was president of the Minnesota state council of defense. In addition to her work on the executive board of the general federation she is also director of its program on Americanization. She is in constant demand all over the United States to speak upon this important subject, and has prepared a booklet outlining this work for clubs. She is the daughter of Rev. Charles G. Ames, an eminent Boston divine, and was reared in an exceptionally brilliant literary atmosphere.

**TO MEET AT OMAHA.**  
The semi-annual executive board meeting of the General Federation of Women's club will be held in Omaha the first week in January, 1920. The chief business will be to arrange for the biennial convention, which is to be held in Des Moines, June 16-22, 1920. The directors of the convention will attend the board meeting and report the convention program and prospects. The Women's club of Omaha will be hostess to the board members and visitors.

**ISSUE NEWS BULLETIN.**  
The Indiana federation of women's clubs is reaching the state press and its membership through a special news bulletin, issued monthly by Miss Lena M. Shannon, state press chairman, of Kokomo. The bulletin gives the latest news and announcements of both individual clubs and the state organization and is promoting club interest and leading to growth in the federation membership.

### STANFORD TO BE A SUPER-SCHOOL

Stanford University, Cal., Dec. 15.—A "super" university may be the latest development in American educational circles according to friends of Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president, and Herbert Hoover, trustee, of Leland Stanford Junior university, who have been watching the growth of the institution during the past few years. Believing that the first two years of college work can be done as well in "junior colleges" departments of public high schools, Stanford University authorities are said to be planning to eliminate freshman and sophomore work from the university curriculum. Fifth and sixth year college of the departments, and it is believed the "super" education will eventually supplant the elementary courses throughout the university. Junior colleges have been established in many of the high schools of California, particularly in the southern part of the state. Herbert Hoover has been a trustee of Stanford University for a number of years, and intimate friends declare he has been backing President Wilbur's attempt for increased specialization in the studies offered by the institution.

### NEW BACTERIOLOGIST AT STATE UNIVERSITY

University of Idaho, Moscow, Dec. 15.—Dr. W. M. Gibbs, who received his Ph. D. degree in bacteriology from the University of Wisconsin, has been appointed professor of bacteriology in the University of Idaho agricultural college and bacteriologist for the Idaho experiment station. This was the announcement made this morning by Dean E. J. Iddings of the college of agriculture.

Dr. Gibbs, who held a commission for more than a year in the army sanitary corps, took his undergraduate work at the University of Missouri, where he first became interested in research experiments in soils. His duties at the university will be both of an instructional and research character.
