NAMPA MEN BEHIND NEW OIL COMPANY JUST INCORPORATED

Nampa, Dec. 20.—An oil development company which is to have its headquarters in this city, filed a copy of its articles of incorporation in the office of the county recorder at Caldwell late yesterday afternoon. The capital stock of the company, which is to be known as the Idaho-Oklahoma Oil Development company, is \$500,000, and the following are named as stockholders: Alex Wilson, Nampa; George Callens, Nampa; W. P. O'Connor, Nampa; A. L. Anderson, Nampa; H. H. Kelm, Nampa; D. D. Ward, Nampa. The newly organized company owns the land it proposes to develop and which is located in Muskege county, Okla., bordering the Arkansas river. This district is producing oil in great quantities and the men interested in the local company are impressed that their land will prove a bonanza.

FARMERS OPPOSE ACTION TAKEN BY BOISE ATTORNEY

Caldwell, Dec. 20.—At a mass meeting held in this city this afternoon, farmers owning lands within the Nampa-Meridian irrigation district which require full government water rights, adopted resolutions opposing the course of Attorney Hugh E. McElroy of Boise, counsel for the Nampa-Meridian irrigation district, in filing a motion in the federal court Tuesday of this week, asking that the answer of the Boise-Payette Water Users' association in argument against the dedication of 50 per cent of Arrowrock reservoir storage water for lands within the district be set aside by the court. Different farmers participating in the mass meeting declared that Mr. McElroy had not reflected their views in filing his motion. A committee composed of the following was appointed to confer with the board of directors of the Nampa-Meridian irrigation district in reference to Mr. McElroy's action and to initiate action in opposition to it: S. L. McLain of Nampa, L. L. Young of Nampa, H. W. Sutton of Nampa, Dr. E. B. Meredith of Nampa and E. S. Hamaker of Nampa. The meeting was attended by more than 20 farmers and was presided over by C. A. Glougie of Nampa.

NEARLY THOUSAND CARS SHIPPED OUT PARMA THIS YEAR

Caldwell, Dec. 20.—Nine hundred and twenty-eight carloads of livestock, grain, potatoes and other farm products were shipped out to the markets from Parma during the first 11 months of this year. Of these shipments there were 351 carloads of livestock, 30 of wheat, 121 of potatoes, 283 of fruit, 7 of clover seed and 65 of hay. This brings the total shipments from Canyon county of livestock, grain, potatoes and other farm products to the market during the first 11 months of the present year up to 6,297 carloads and of this total there were 2,725 carloads from Nampa, 2,644 carloads from this city and 928 carloads from Parma. The county's record of production is a phenomenal one in view of the fact that less than ten years ago the greater part of its area had not been reclaimed from a sagebrush desert.


