AMERICA'S DEAD BEING WELL CARED FOR IN FRANCE BY THE ARMY GRAVES REGISTRATION BUREAU ORGANIZATION

That the United States army officials connected with the graves registration service in France have made every effort to make the American military cemeteries in the battle areas in France a fitting resting place for America's heroic dead, is a statement made by John A. Owens, of Taunton, Mass., who has just returned from France after completing his work with the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities.

He has taken hundreds of photographs of individual American graves and these have been forwarded to the parents or next of kin of the deceased soldiers. In this work he has received the active cooperation of the officials of the graves registration service, who extended to him every possible courtesy and assisted the K. of C. man in many ways in locating isolated graves and cemeteries in which but a few bodies were interred.

COLONEL KROMER IN CHARGE.

The graves registration service in France is in charge of Colonel Kromer, the head office being located at Rue Boissy d'Anglas, Paris, and it is at this office where the records of all the American dead in France are kept.

Visitors are first directed to this office where a modern filing system has been installed. All information regarding the particular soldier inquired after is supplied in a few minutes by the clerks in charge.

"What is the condition of the American military cemeteries which you have visited in France?" Mr. Owens was asked by the writer. In his reply, the K. of C. secretary said in part: "From first hand knowledge of hundreds of American cemeteries which I have visited in the battle area, I think that the condition of the cemeteries is a wonderful one."

Continuing, the K. of C. man said: "It is true the condition of the French soil in many places has made the work of grading most difficult for during the rainy season in many spots the soil will sink a few inches, but under the direction of the officer in charge, the graves are being regraded."

"Are there many unknown dead in the various cemeteries?" was another question asked Mr. Owens. He replied, "Taking everything into consideration, there are very few unidentified American dead in France, the percentage being far lower than that of any other nation and this was brought about primarily by the fact that when the American troops went into action the only creed they knew was to advance, with the result that from the time they started a drive they kept going and going until the armistice halted operations."

"How the Americans advanced is but a repetition of a story told by the little French woman in the small town of Vaux near Chateau Thierry. She told how the Germans were in the town and the French on the outskirts and there was but very little action until the arrival of 'Les soldats Americains,' who as soon as they got near the place opened fire with their artillery and the Germans started on the run over the hill."

"Another thing to take into consideration in connection with the statistics of the unidentified dead with the other armies is the fact that certain ground was fought over time and again, this being very true up in the Chemin-des-Dames sector, the Somme and in the Champagne sector as well as outside of Verdun.
