

**W. N. SWEET NEW
PRESIDENT OF BOISE
CHAMBER COMMERCE**

**Board of Directors Completes
Organization of Civic Body
Successor to Commercial
Club—Hill Is Secretary.**

By the election of W. N. Sweet as president, F. I. Newhouse and C. C. Anderson as vice presidents, M. P. Meholin treasurer and W. H. P. Hill secretary, the board of directors of the Boise Chamber of Commerce Saturday completed the organization of that body as the outgrowth of and successor to the Boise Commercial Club.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce were themselves elected Friday night in an election conducted by mail in which the membership of the new commercial body, over 1800 strong, participated. Group meetings of members have been held in the last week, 100 at a time, to determine by symposiums and ballots on a working program for the chamber. But not until the officers were chosen Saturday was the formal transfer made of the Commercial Club's civic responsibility to the Chamber of Commerce.

THE NEW OFFICERS.
W. N. Sweet, the new president, is head of the Sweet-Teller Hardware company, a former member of the state legislature, prominent in every progressive public movement, and one of the most active members and directors of the old club. He took a leading part in the recent reorganization campaign, heading the canvassing team which brought in more applications for membership in the new body than any other team.

Messrs. Newhouse and Anderson, the new vice presidents, likewise participated actively in the reorganization. They will rank equally in their office, and will decide between themselves which shall succeed to the chair in the absence of the president.

The new treasurer, Mr. Meholin, is vice president of the Pacific National bank. The plan of the new body is to rotate the office annually, giving each bank in turn custody of its funds.

Secretary Hill is retained in the office he has occupied since last July.

He was formerly a sales manager for the Idaho Power company. For two months prior to the campaign by which the American City bureau brought about the establishment of the new chamber, Mr. Hill, at the request of the old club's officers, was working out a plan for its reorganization. The new board decided to keep him on the job under the new regime.

T. L. Martin, retiring president, devoted his term in office principally to bringing about the move by which the Commercial club was made over into a larger, more representative and democratic "chamber of citizenship." It was his hobby, and he worked tirelessly to help make it popular. He was rewarded in the election last week by being placed on the new board of directors with the largest vote of any candidate.

The work of the American City bureau staff in installing the machinery of the Chamber of Commerce is now practically complete. After inaugurating the membership forum, by which the members of the chamber are brought together weekly to discuss its business, T. C. Fitzgibbon and P. E. Magruder, the bureau's representatives, will leave for Spokane to install the new chamber system there.

MEMBERSHIP IN I. W. W.

**PROHIBITED BY ORDER
OF JUDGE IN SPOKANE**

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 3.—Superior Judge Webster today made permanent the injunction enjoining any persons from membership in the I. W. W. from subscribing to any of its activities, from circulating its literature or from having any connection with the organization.

Violation of the injunction is punishable as contempt of court. The injunction has been in temporary operation in Spokane county for over six weeks.

Characterizing the activities of the I. W. W. as a menace to public safety to morality and to society, Judge Webster stated that he had no hesitancy in pronouncing the injunction permanent.

**KUNA CENTER OF A
RICH, PROGRESSIVE
FARMING DISTRICT**

**Alfalfa, Cows, Business and
Money Are Assets of Growing
Town on Main Line of
O. S. L.**

Alfalfa, cows, business and money. These are the assets of the busy town of Kuna, located on the main line of the Short Line in the south-east section of Ada county. It had a busy year in 1913. But a few years ago the town of Kuna was a dream of D. R. Hubbard, its founder, who owned a considerable amount of sage brush land in that territory.

This land had a gentle slope to the south and was situated far enough from Nampa and Boise to make an ideal town in his opinion and with a few others, the plans for incorporating a village were started. The first movement was the putting down of a deep well of sufficient size to supply a large town. This was done and following it the town of Kuna was built without effort. Like Topsy in "Uncle Tom's Cabin," it just grew.

Today Kuna stands as the supply point of a large agricultural community and a favorite shipping point for the southern section of Ada county. It has a substantial bank, liberal in its loans to the farmers, which it recognized as an asset to the town. It contains a modern drug store, a large lumber yard and retail stores sufficient to supply the demands of the growing agricultural country of which it is the center.

FINE DAIRY PLANT.
Kuna boasts the finest dairy plant in the state. It is known as the Avalon creamery and its fine Holstein herd was among the prize winners at the Gen. State Fair and other fairs in Idaho. The products from this modern dairy are shipped both east and west and a goodly amount reaches Boise.

Being in the heart of a great alfalfa district, much hay is shipped from that section to eastern markets and there is some likelihood of the establishment of an alfalfa meal factory.

Something of the resources of the Kuna territory were made known to the rest of the county and throughout the state when that section of the county came across in the Liberty loan drives, Red Cross drives and other war drives with far more than its quota on each occasion and was one of the first sections several times to make a report of its accomplishments.

FARMERS PROGRESSIVE.
The farmers about Kuna are progressive. They have built substantial homes, improved their farms to such an extent as to attract attention and have them stocked with high-grade milch cows and thoroughbred hogs, which the alfalfa industry brings them excellent returns.

The Kuna section organized a road district and built an excellent road from the town to the Meridian highway, which is to be improved under the \$1,000,000 road improvement plan of Ada county.

The town is out for new business enterprises and its citizens are willing to go the limit in offering lands and inducements for substantial enterprises of value in a farming community.

MORA ALSO GROWS.
Mora is another progressive point in Ada county which has made a record in agricultural development. It is 13 miles southwest of Boise and four miles from Kuna, which is its banking center. Some excellent ranches are tributary to Mora and it has showed great development in 1913.

**CHANGE OF VENUE
GRANTED 11 I. W. W.**

Montesano, Wash., Jan. 3.—The 11 alleged I. W. W. who are charged with murder in connection with the killing of American legion members at Centralia, Wash., armistice day will not be tried in Montesano; that is a definitely established fact tonight. But whether their fate shall be decided at Tacoma or Olympia is still uncertain. Superior Judge John Wilson late today granted the application of George Vanderveer, attorney for the 11 defendants for a change of venue, the second that has been made in this case. Wilson announced he will decide whether the trials are to be held at Tacoma or Olympia next Wednesday afternoon.

**ARRESTED FOR THE
ALLEGED ROBBERY OF
BANK AT OMAHA**

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 3.—Mike Finn alias George Brown and his brother, George Finn alias Tom McKay, were arrested here tonight and held for Omaha authorities in connection with the robbery of the Farmers and Merchants State bank at Menon, Neb., Dec. 31.

Both were "picked up" at request of the police at Omaha. A gang of bandits escaped with \$115,000 from the bank after locking eight persons and four clerks in a vault.

**SAN FRANCISCO GOES
AFTER TICKET SCALPERS**

San Francisco, Jan. 3.—San Francisco's campaign against theatre ticket scalpers, started yesterday with the issuance by the grand jury of nine warrants, began to bear fruit today when five of these named in the warrants paid the \$300 tax to escape arrest.
