In the course of a quarrel between them reports say, the general's adjutant shot Trotsky three times, killing him.

Promoter Nick Collins announced Saturday night that his terms had been accepted by Sam Clapham, heavyweight wrestling champion of Great Britain, who is at present in the middle west, to meet Ad Santel in a finish wrestling match at the next show of the Boise Athletic club at the Pinney theater, Monday, Jan. 12.

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CLAPHAM KNOWS SANTEL

Clapham has competed with most of the big men of the game whose names are familiar to American fans—Gotch, Stecher, Hackenschmidt, Cutler, Olson, Taylor, Santel, Miaki, Harbertson and Challenger. He says, in his agreement to come to Boise, that he met Santel in San Francisco about three years ago, and is almost sure he can handle him easily unless the light heavyweight has developed more prowess than he had at that time.

Promoter Collins adds that Clapham will bring a reputation of being one of the fastest wrestlers who ever appeared in this country, an equal to Santel in that respect, and one of the finest looking men who ever stripped for a match. The followers of the game will doubtless concede that Nick has done handsomely in the way of replacing Peters, the wrestling sheriff.
