

DEBATING PREMIER DENIES STORIES OF 70,000 EXECUTIONS

Yarns Spread of Wholesale Killings Since Overthrow of Bela Kun Soviet Government Fairy Tales.

Budapest, Jan. 5.—The stories spread abroad that 10,000 communists have been executed in Hungary since the overthrow of Bela Kun's Soviet government, are fairy tales, Karl Huszar, the new Hungarian premier, declared in an interview with the United Press today. "So far 28 persons have been sentenced to death in action in legitimate courts against the Bolsheviks," Huszar said. "The sentences resulted not from political crimes but on the evidence of reliable witnesses that the condemned had murdered and robbed numerous persons."

MANY LEADERS LYNCHED "It is true that after collapse of the Hungarian Bolshevik government a number of red leaders were lynched by embittered crowds," Huszar continued, but he ridiculed the stories of the so-called "white terror" as pure myths. "After the military collapse of Austria-Hungary," Huszar said, "the resultant confusion and weakness plunged the Karolyi government into the abyss."

"Criminal leaders of the Bolsheviks, returning from Russia, utilized the consequent disorder to summon the dictatorship of the proletariat. The history of the Hungarian Bolshevik is well known. They conduct themselves in such a manner that the people and the nation were economically ruined. "Daily the Bolsheviks sentenced many to death, knowing they were guilty of nothing but a desire to see return of orderly moral conditions. The red troops murdered thousands after the most perfidious trial at the hands of revolutionary tribunals."

2000 EXECUTED Huszar said the number thus executed was estimated at not less than 2000. The number executed for disobedience after forcible enrollment in the red armies, is not known, but it must be high, he added.

The present Hungarian government was chosen by the people. It is responsible under my leadership to the national assembly. We are trying to restore order and economic and moral safety."

Asked if Hungary still is menaced by Bolshevism the premier replied: "Hungarians now stand far from the Bolshevik groups."

EVENING AT AUTOMOBILE SHOW

American Salon of Motordom Has Everything From Tin Lizzies to Latest Luxurious Limousines.

New York, Jan. 5.—From near flyovers to palaces, from \$750 cars to de luxe pieces of motor grandeur, the war tax on which costs nearly that much, from the ordinary "road louse" to the fulfillment of the dream of a modern cinderella every conceivable kind of a motor car is on display at the annual New York automobile show which opened here this afternoon. Eighty-four standard makes of cars, ranging in price from \$750 to \$1000, including foreign and domestic manufacture, are exhibited. No radical departures from the conservative lines of the "war season" are seen in the bodies or under the hoods.

NO MECHANICAL SURPRISES. Stream lines will prevail with a few deviations in the nature of "bottle ship" and "tank" bodies on closed cars.

The mechanical authorities incline to a six-cylinder motor with 1000 to 1200 cubic inches to the eight and 12-cylinder ranks. More "four's" are in evidence than at any time since the fashion turned to higher powered cars.

While mechanical innovations have shown no radical departures, wide fields have been covered by the special body manufacturers in providing luxurious fittings for the interior.

BEAUTY AIDS BUILT IN. In one high priced limousine a vanity case is built in the side with brush and comb, rouge box, mirror, powder packets and all the beauty aids for the fair passenger. In the opposite side are a cigarette lighter, cigar and cigar holder, and a small tube through which ashes can be conveyed to the exterior.

Aluminum wheels and hoods are popular in the sport models of speed cars. The most popular American sports have a guaranteed speed of 100 miles an hour "without effort."

The show continues for one week under the auspices of the national automobile chamber of commerce.

DANIELS ASKS MEN SPEAK ON AWARDS

Secretary Navy Wants Naval and Marine Corps Members to Have Voice in the Awards Controversy.

Washington, Jan. 5.—Secretary Daniels tonight ordered that every man in the navy and marine corps be given a voice in the naval awards controversy.

Daniels directed all commanding officers to publish a request by him "to all persons in the naval service to send to the board of naval awards, statements regarding any service involving courage or distinction rendered in the world war that such service may be properly recognized."

The Knight naval awards board will meet in Washington Monday to reconsider the whole list of awards as decided on by Secretary Daniels. Every man in the naval establishment, whether officer or enlisted man, or whether directly affected, may present his opinion to the board under Daniels' order tonight.

The statistical report showing recommendations of commanding officers for naval war honors, the action of the Knight board on the recommendations, and Secretary Daniels' final action on the board's recommendations, was virtually completed tonight by the navy department. This report will be sent Chairman Page of the senate naval affairs committee and will be made public early next week.
