

STUDENTS FROM ALL PARTS STATE ENROLL AT THE UNIVERSITY

Annual Mining Short Course Promises to Prove Very Popular—Enrollments Credited to All Sections.

University of Idaho, Moscow, Jan. 9.—From Porthill near the Canadian border to Halley in southern Idaho, students have enrolled in the annual mining short course of eight weeks offered by the University of Idaho school of mines which opened Jan. 5. Most interested in mining but without thorough technical training are finding the course invaluable.

Men from Mountain Home, Boise, Halley, Spirit Lake, Porthill, Moscow, Spokane, Washington, and British Columbia are members of the short course school and more are expected daily.

Students are already arriving at Moscow to register for the miners short course," according to Francis A. Thompson, dean of the Idaho school of mines, "and we are having no difficulty in finding boarding and rooming accommodations for them."

TAKE UP FLOTATION.

The short course this year in addition to providing the usual lines of instruction in assaying, mineralogy, geology, ore-testing and ore treatment, will be oriented particularly toward the study of flotation. This flotation work will culminate in a special flotation institute or conference to be held the last week in February. While this is being planned primarily for millmen and assayers already familiar with ore dressing operations, the short course men will be welcome at the session which will be held at the school of mines.

A number of prominent flotation operators whose names will be announced later have promised to attend as special lecturers and an invitation has been extended to Will H. Coghill, the famous flotation physicist who has expressed his intention of being present. Mr. Coghill is a member of the United States bureau of mines staff and it is anticipated that other members of the bureau staff will also be present. A. W. Fahrenwald, a member of the school of mines faculty and the author of "Testing for the Flotation Process," a widely used book, will be in charge of the laboratory and testing work of this special flotation course.
