

COMMONER OFFERS SOLUTION FOR SETTLING PACT FIGHT
FOURTEEN NATIONS EXCHANGE RATIFICATIONS WITH GERMANY

U. S. OFFICERS WILL WAGE WAR ON BOOTLEGGER IN THIS STATE

Idaho Internal Revenue Collector Receives Instructions About Enforcement of the Law. FEDERAL ACT EFFECTIVE DURING PRESENT WEEK Private Dwellings Will Not Be Molested if Liquors Used Only for Personal Consumption or for Guests.

Preparatory to a strict enforcement of the national prohibition act, which will become effective on Jan. 16, Collector Lewis Williams for the district of Idaho has received detailed instructions from the department at Washington as to the method of procedure.

Collector Williams will mail to each person of whom he may have knowledge of the possession of liquors for sale, two copies of an inventory form and report. These forms should be made up in duplicate, properly signed and sworn to before sending to the collector, and one copy only mailed to the collector and the other retained by the person making it, for investigation by revenue agents.

GOVERNOR STEPHENS PARDONS ABE REUF

PEACE REIGNS OVER EUROPE FIRST TIME IN OVER 5 YEARS

Treaty of Versailles Declared Formally in Effect Late Saturday Following Exchange of Ratifications in Paris. GERMAN DELEGATES ARE FIRST TO SIGN Proceedings Simple and Protocol Is Signed in Presence of the Envoys of 14 Nations—America Not Represented.

By HENRY WOOD. (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Paris, Jan. 10.—Germany was at peace with the allies tonight. The treaty of Versailles, completed after months of labor last June, was declared formally in effect late today. Exchange of ratifications was completed at 4:11 o'clock this afternoon.

SENATE PASSES SEDITION BILL LATE SATURDAY

Washington, Jan. 10.—Congress today took another step toward stamping out revolutionary violence in the United States. The senate passed the Sedition bill containing authority sought by Attorney General Palmer in his campaign against the "reds." The bill now goes to the house. Should it meet approval there and at the White House, authorities say they will be armed with the final stage of the campaign against Bolshevism in America.
