## DUTCH JAKE'S PICNIC

An Entertainment at the Opera House and a Grand Naval Battle.

Dutch Jake's fourth annual picnic was the most successful one he has given. His crowd came out here Saturday morning and remained until Sunday evening, leaving at about 11 o'clock. They pitched their tents at Mica bay and chartered the Defender and barge for use during their stay. Saturday evening they gave a variety entertainment in the opera house to a large audience. The show consisted of vocal and instrumental music and minstrelsy. During the performance Dutch Jake was invited to the stage where Miss Alice O'Hara and Maggie Thomson presented him with a large bouquet on behalf of his admiring friends. The sham battle Sunday evening proved to be the finest pyrotechnical display ever seen on the lake. From the water the steamers with Dutch Jake's Flagship Olympia stormed the Spanish fort situated on a point of Tabbs' hill. The boats were brilliantly lighted with colored lights and amidst the booming of cannon from the shore batteries slowly approached the fort. When in range the signal was given and a perfect stream of shot and shell from hundreds of skyrockets and roman candles poured down upon the Spanish land forces. After the batteries had been silenced Dutch Jake and his brave men behind the guns of the Olympia went ashore in small boats and handed down the flag of the Dons. The effect of the multi-colored lights as they reflected on the water, the long streams of fire belching forth from the cannon and the other fireworks combined to make a grand display. The battle was a success in every particular. Ordinance Sergeant Hoper, of Fort Sherman, was in command of the shore batteries.

Thomas Weston, for some years a resident of this place, left Monday evening for Whatcom, Wash., where he has a good position running a stationary engine in a shingle mill.

Commencing next Monday, July 31, the new steamer Schley will make her initial trip up the lake and St. Joe river leaving here after the arrival of the train. Her regular runs will be Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week to the head of navigation, returning Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Mr. John E. Linn, of Litchfield, Minnesota and Miss Mae Stevenson, of Ingham county, Michigan, were united in marriage at the Methodist parsonage, Wednesday afternoon, July 27th, by Rev. T. G. Hodgson. They came from Spokane on the morning train and returned to the city the same evening.

Mrs. J. I. Shalls narrowly escaped being killed from a stray bullet fired by some boys who were shooting a rifle near the school house, Thursday evening. She was sitting on the porch at her home when a bullet whizzed by her head and penetrated the siding on the house. Shooting within the incorporated limits of the town is unlawful and if it is not stopped will result in killing some one.

The city council of Harrison met Monday evening and took preliminary steps to perfect the organization of the city government under the articles of incorporation. The trustees appointed by the board of commissioners are George Thompson, E. P. Harris, E. W. Wheeler, George S. Johnson, and M. W. Frost. The matter of the appointment of a mayor was deferred until July 26. The board of trustees expect to complete the organization as soon as possible.

Judge Mayhew has appointed S. P. Donnelly receiver for the George Oakes and other property formerly owned by the Coeur d'Alene Railway & Navigation Co. The case has been in the courts for years and was begun by W. T. Spalding for money due on a construction contract. Mr. Spalding got judgment for \$38,587 in 1896. The Northern Pacific now owns the property and in case the judgment is not satisfied by August 21 the receiver is directed to sell.

Judge Stewart, Attorney Borah andorney and nine of the jurymen who were connected with the trial of Paul Corcoran, charged with the murder of James Chyne, were passengers down on the Coeur d'Alene Thursday evening. The trial resulted in finding Corcoran guilty and Judge Stewart gave him a sentence of seventeen years in the penitentiary. The jurymen were returning to their homes in the southern part of Shoshone county. The trials of others indicted for their connection with the riots will come up at the September term of court.

## THE NEW BRIDGE IN DANGER

Several large beams of logs have been turned loose and are lodged against the piling of the new bridge at Fort Sherman. The heavy strain is liable to do considerable damage unless the authorities look after the matter and have the owners remove the logs. The Phoenix Mill, of Spokane, passed over 4,000,000 feet of logs under this bridge without lodging them against the pilings and it is the general belief that the present jam is the result of intentional neglect on the part of the Spokane & Idaho Lumber Co., owners of the logs. The matter has stirred up much ill feeling, especially among the settlers across the river and should the bridge go out as a result of the log jam serious trouble may result. The people say that this work is purely spite and boom after boom of logs were turned loose after the jam started without an effort to open the channel. The logs now block the whole river and the county officials will be derelict in their duty if they allow an individual or company to destroy public property to the value of several thousand dollars without an attempt to stop it. If the Spokane & Idaho people are looking for law they will undoubtedly find it. The commissioners should take immediate steps to prevent the probable destruction of this bridge.

A report that a couple of bear had been seen in Wood's meadow caused a ripple of excitement on the streets Tuesday morning, and a few of the leading nimrods and all the dogs in town which would follow were soon in hot pursuit. Later it transpired that the smaller of the two bears, about half grown, had been treed and was being guarded by Silas Erwin. Young Bruin did not fancy his position up in the tree however and soon descended. A lively tussle ensued between bear and dog which resulted in the dog coming out second best, when Mr. Erwin took a hand in the fracas and with a club commenced belaboring Bruin in such a fashion that the animal soon beat a hasty retreat, and when the nimrods arrived with their dogs nothing but signs were left. The dogs refused or were unable to take up the trail and the escape was soon given up in disgust.—Republican

The Discovery Came Too Late

A field has been discovered by two Chicago professors that is said to prevent decay in the human body. It is stated as a fact that a Chicago dog 14 years old was given a dose and forthwith became as "lively as a puppy." The members of the old Rathdrum ring will now kick themselves because the discovery was not made sooner. Had the lymphatic fluid of a few young goats been injected into some of the ring horses a few years ago they might possess life enough to draw the golden chariot. But they are dead as Boreas himself, Alexander's famous horse. The lymph of all the goats in Christendom whether used hypodermically or otherwise, would not cause a pulsation. Yes, they are dead, dead. Reckless extravagance caused their downfall.—Silver Blade.

Improvements at the Penitentiary.

Governor Steuneger, Secretary of State Patrie and State Engineer Ross, went to the penitentiary yesterday to select a site for a new cell house. There are now 127 convicts and no accommodation for 25 of them. These 25 are obliged to be kept in another room not designed for that purpose.

A cell house with a capacity of 150 convicts will be built, which will more than double the present accommodations, and supply an urgent need.

The arrangements are not yet complete, but the governor will go to the prison again today to complete all details.

Warden Halley is arranging the scaffold upon which the chinaman will hang on Aug. 25th for the murder of his cousin in Halley.

The warden has sunk a well near the wall of the penitentiary 47 feet deep and has struck a fine flow of cold water.—Idaho Statesman

### Dance Hall Death Dance.

Wm. Reeser, a dance hall keeper at Fort Hill, was shot and instantly killed while resisting arrest by Constable Dendurand, on Thursday of last week. Reeser leaves a wife and four children in Nebraska, besides the woman with whom he was living at his Fort Hill dance hall.

Alice Ristine, a dance hall girl from Fort Hill, committed suicide on Wednesday evening of last week by jumping overboard from the S. F. Alberta, a few miles this side of Fort Hill. It is said she had attempted suicide on three previous occasions. Efforts to recover her body failed. It was just at sunset when she took the fatal plunge, and she had just finished slugging "Just as the Sun Went Down."—Kootenai Herald.

In addition to these it is learned that many grocers are selling what they call their own private or special brands. These powders are made for the grocer, his name being put upon the labels by manufacturers of alum powders in St. Louis, Chicago, Kansas City, Salt Lake etc. The manufacturers, it is said sold their efforts greatly aided by the ambition of the grocer to sell a powder with his own name upon the label, especially as he can make an abnormal profit upon it. Many grocers, doubtless, do not know that the powders they are thus pushing are alum powders which would be actually contraband in some sections if sold without disguise.

It is quite impossible to give the names of all the alum baking powders in the market. They are constantly appearing in all sorts of disguises, under all sorts of cognomens, and at all kinds of prices, even as low as five and ten cents a pound. They can be avoided however, by the housekeeper who will bear in mind that all baking powders sold at twenty-five cents or less per pound are liable to contain alum, as pure cream of tartar powders cannot be produced at anything like this price.
