THE EVENING PRESS.

The publisher of the Daily Press is more than pleased with the loyal support given the enterprise both by business men and citizens. It speaks well for the enterprise and public spirit of those who have cast their lot in this garden of the west. Coeur d'Alene grows because her business men and citizens believe in the city and give its public enterprises their hearty support. With this, the first issue of a daily newspaper in Kootenai county, we find most of our business and professional men represented in its columns.

The daily is launched as a business enterprise, and because we believe that the growth and prosperity of the city demands something more than a weekly newspaper. It will be devoted chiefly to the publication of local, county and state news, with a telegraph press report covering the important happenings of the world.

In political matters it will be broad gauge and independent, but not neutral. The best interests of Coeur d'Alene and its citizens, regardless of party affiliations, will be advocated and supported by the daily Press and in return we ask reciprocal support from the people. The future of the Daily Press is largely in their hands.

We do not believe that the people will agree with the statement of Rev. Litherland's Sunday evening sermon. In the first place the Press is published for all the people and does not attempt to reform the world. That is not its mission, although its past record has been on the moral side of all questions and we expect to continue that policy regardless of whether it suits radical reformers or their opponents. Moral reforms should naturally be fathered by the ministers, but they ought to be consistent and make their words good by deeds. Abuse never reformed men nor won the world.

KOOTENAI PLACER MINES

Five Pans of Dirt from Bedrock Teat Yields a Total of \$10.53.

State Mine Inspector Robert N. Bell visited a highly interesting placer property in Kootenai. He states it is the richest placer grounds in this state since the early days and compares only with the bonanza discoveries of the early times and those of more recent date in Alaska. This property is on Tyson creek, in the southeastern corner of Kootenai 1 1/4 miles up from St. Maries river, and belongs to the Tyson Consolidated Gold Mining & Milling company of Toledo, Ohio. Mr. Bell narrates that those in charge told him the gravel on bedrock carried from 80 cents to \$8 a pan. He told them he had been hearing of such gravel all his life but had never seen any; they would have to show him. This challenge was promptly accepted. Going to the point where the rich channel had been opened, they proceeded to make a test.

The bank had been caved in and rocks and trees thrown on it in order to protect the ground from snipers. A lot of work had to be done to reach the face. Mr. Bell and those with him worked four hours in the broiling sun to get the debris cleared away. When this had been done he found a streak on bedrock from six inches to a foot of compact material. Mr. Bell took out five pans from this bed rock stratum and was astonished at the results. He brought the gold out in five vials.

The metal has been weighed up, and the returns from the five pans shown to have these values: \$0.60, \$1.50, \$1.75, \$1.70, and \$5.00, a total of \$10.53, or an average of \$2.12 a pan.

Mr. Bell says he never saw anything like it before. The gold is not rounded, showing it has not been carried far.

The channel in which the streak exists has been traced 1000 feet, it is from 10 to 18 feet deep, and 100 feet wide, and the management estimates the entire ground will average \$50 a cubic yard.

It is a rather flat country and water is difficult to secure. The company owning the ground is laying eight miles of 10 inch steel pipe. This is to carry the waters of Olson creek, which is on the other side of the St. Maries, the water being siphoned across the latter stream. It will be delivered into a reservoir. This district first attracted atten-

tion as a quartz country in 1895. Several quartz properties were located at that time and some work done on them. Mr. Bell has a specimen of one nugget of gold. It is associated with tellurium.

In 1900 the placer ground was discovered and considerable excitement resulted. Litigation arose over the claims and this was recently settled in favor of the Toledo company. This company owns several quartz claims and 200 acres of placer grounds.

The state came very near owning the rich channel. It has a 36 school section and a selected 35 only half a mile away. Some of the states' ground is good but not high grade, while the only way to get water on it would be to pump from the river. This ground is covered with timber which has been sold.

Mr. Bell went up there at the request of the state land board to look into the mineral value of this land. The Toledo company wishes to get hold of some or all of it. It has a right-of-way across the needed land for a flume but would like to own it and dump on the grounds after working it.


