### Must Pay for Rides.

Free transportation by virtue of the terms of the new rate bill, recently passed by congress, is practically a thing of the past, says the Post-Telegraph. The Idaho railroads carrying out the spirit of the law have decided to deny all the requests for free transportation. Newspapers that have advertising contracts will be given transportation as usual, but even a newspaper man who does not work on a newspaper which has such a contract cannot secure a free pass from one town to another.

The restrictions of the law are being enforced on the Idaho roads even as against employees. An Oregon Short Line employee will not be able to travel a mile on Rio Grande transportation such as his line wishes to give him. The law is being enforced particularly against politicians and office holders. Annuals have not been called in because the law does not go into effect until January 1, 1907, but a large number of Idaho people who now carry annuals will have them cut off next New Year's day.

### Town May Lose Auditorium.

In compliance with the instructions from the board of directors of the Fraternal Hall Association, an inspection of the building was made yesterday by the special committee who had the matter in hand. Architect L. L. Rand, of Spokane, who superintended the construction of the building, was present, as was George Williams, Architect, of this city. Representing the Association were James Harte and J. C. White, of the board of directors. This committee accompanying the architects made a full and careful inspection of the building and found it in fair condition. The inspection was made to ascertain whether or not the building would be weakened by converting the lower floor into store rooms, a change which the association has under consideration. Architect Geo. Williams

will figure on the probable cost of such a change and make a report to the directors. Should the association decide to convert the auditorium into store rooms, this city would be without an opera house. This would indeed be a calamity that the town can ill afford to permit, for it would do away with such amusements as we have.
