APR. 6 IS WIN THE WAR DAY

CHALLIS WILL OBSERVE THE DAY BY BIG PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION

A LIBERTY PARADE COMPOSED OF ALL LOYAL AMERICANS WILL FORM AND MARCH TO DODGE HALL AT 2:30

Next Saturday, April 6th., marks the first anniversary of Uncle Sam's entry into the present gigantic struggle in which two classes are fighting, one for the mastery of the world, ruthlessly setting its iron autocratic heel on defenseless women and children, crushing out their lives without a qualm of conscience. While the other class, (with which America, God bless Her, is aligned) is desperately fighting to the end that from now, henceforth, and forever the snow-white plumage of the dove of peace will never be stained a deep red by the blood of her sons and the sons of her Allies on the gory battlefields of Hun origin, lust and fiendish desire for autocratic control.

Governor Alexander, by proclamation, has set aside Saturday, April 6th as "National Win-The-War Day" and calls upon all patriotic and loyal citizens to renew their faith and allegiance to this great country of ours by aiding in every way possible, all war movements.

The local Council of Defense is therefore arranging for a big, patriotic demonstration on that day, in which it is expected that all who want to help win the war will take part. The big parade, headed by the school children, the local members of the Council of Defense and veterans of other wars, will form near the McGowan store and march to Hartman's Drug store, turning to the right and marching one block and from there to the Dodge hall where a short program will be rendered. The parade will form at 2:30, preceded by parents of our boy heroes who have offered their lives, if need be for the great cause each one of us is called upon to support. If you want to help win the war make a public demonstration of your desire by joining in the big Liberty parade. Our boys are marching every day in the cause of Liberty.

Veterans of the Civil War are requested to be on hand and cars will be provided for them. No other cars will be permitted in the parade which will occur regardless of weather conditions. Veterans of the Spanish-American War will be marshals of the day.

There will be a big meeting in May Monday night under the joint control of the Lemhi and Custer county Liberty loan committees. A. J. Higgins, who has charge of the Custer county committee from Pahsamaroi, has appointed Mrs. James Hooper and I. R. Wilson as his lieutenants and they in turn are selecting a larger committee. There is to be music from Salmon and high-class entertainments. Mr. Higgins expects to leave for the valley Friday or Saturday to be in readiness for the big drive.

The third Liberty loan drive opens next Saturday, April 6; which has been officially designated as "National Win-The-War-Day" by proclamation issued by Governor Alexander. On that day, and the succeeding days when the drive is in progress, every Idahoan is expected by the State Liberty Loan committee to do his duty by subscribing for the maximum amount of bonds, thereby assuring the government that their home state will go up and over the top. The committee holds that every dollar that goes into a Liberty bond strikes directly at the kaiser and the German enemy.

PRETTY HOT STUFF BAR DISLOYAL TEACHERS

Custer County has great reason to be proud of the new industry established by the Hon. Barzilla Clark, formerly mayor of Idaho Falls, at the Yankee Fork Hot Springs, near the Sunbeam dam. The temperature of the springs never varies and at 103 degrees Fahrenheit an ideal situation was found for the Clark Giant Incubator.

One thousand eggs are required for each slide or section, and by a most ingenious development of the Schmitzel gravity system, the slides are turned or reversed every eighteen hours.

The first hatching was March 30th and the result was phenomenal. Mr. William Giles, business manager, Robinson Bar Hotel, Custer County, Idaho, will receive orders for "fryers" in lots of 100, after May 20th next.

Teachers in this State who refuse to assist in war work will lose their certificates as well as their positions. Chairman Bryan of the state council made this plan when it developed in Ada county that a teacher in one of the schools had refused to help in Red Cross work or in the thrift stamp campaign. For religious reasons the teacher objected. Patrons of the school district became indignant and she tendered her resignation. Chairman Bryan, who is also commissioner of education in Idaho, made it known that disloyalty will be considered grounds for revocation of licenses.


