IDAHO BUDGET

Fire starting in the kitchen of a hotel at Emmett caused a loss of \$4000.

Plans for the annual Labor Day celebration September 2 by the Boise Trades and Labor council are being made.

Bumper crops prevail in Idaho. The problem now confronting the Idaho farmers, is how to get sufficient help to harvest the war production.

Drug stores will close hereafter in Boise every Sunday afternoon from 1 to 6 o'clock, according to an agreement reached by the druggists of the capitol city.

Nampa gave the drafted boys who left for Camp Lewis last week a rousing sendoff. A crowd of more than 2500 people were at the depot to see them off.

There has just been received by the Twin Falls county Red Cross chapter \$2000 worth of yarn to be made into 2325 pairs of socks and 400 sweaters by September 1.

W. H. Hochbaum, state county agent leader, is confronted with the problem of filling seven county agent vacancies in the state and having no material with which to fill them.

Plans of the Nampa Commercial club committee for the harvest festival are taking shape and it is assured that Nampa will this year have the best celebration that has yet been put on.

County agricultural agents and farm bureaus are making a survey of the bean and potato crop supply and demand in the state, similar to a survey of hay crop conditions just completed.

Upon an offer made by the county fair association, this year's fair at Rupert has been turned over to the farm bureau, which organization promises a big county fair September 13, 19 and 20.

Co-operation in war work and food conservation was the keynote of an enthusiastic gathering of between 600 and 700 members of the vocational clubs of Twin Falls county at Twin Falls on July 25.

Plans are being perfected by tractor dealers of Idaho in co-operation with farmers and agricultural agents to hold a power farming school as a feature of the Idaho state fair in Boise during September.

The sewer system in Preston has been practically completed and is ready for the acceptance of the mayor and city council. Resident and property holders are now busy making connections with the system.

Refusing to submit to a surgical operation which would probably have saved his life, "Tom," a Chinaman of Jordan valley, died at the general hospital at Caldwell from blood poisoning which had resulted from a broken leg.

Golf enthusiasts of southern Idaho will have the opportunity of trying their skill in competition beginning August 3 in a southern Idaho amateur championship golf tournament staged by the Boise County club on their links.

Caldwell's engineering department is installing eight traffic street lights. The lights are being placed on the principal cross streets at the busiest corners. If the eight are successful between twenty-five and thirty will be installed.

It is learned that so far as statistics now available show, sheep and cattle have increased materially in Idaho during the past year, while hogs, in spite of the high cost of grains for feed, will probably maintain their average production.

F. J. Gary of Boise is in receipt of a German war helmet and a purse containing paper money in the form of a five-mark piece and a letter of credit which Jude Gary, his son, sent him from France. They were taken from a German prisoner by Young Gary.

The public utilities commission has been advised that the interstate commerce commission has set September 3 as the date for the hearing of the utilities commission's protest against proposed advanced rates on charges for reconsignment and diversion of green fruit and vegetable shipments.

Emmett Hershey, aged 19, died at Idaho Falls, July 23, as the result of a mysterious accident. The boy left home on a motorcycle to attend early mass at the Catholic church. Several hours later his parents started to church in their auto and a short distance from home discovered the body lying in a partly-filled water ditch beside the road.

Bumper crops are predicted for eastern Idaho this season, according to an estimation made by Secretary of State W. T. Dougherty and State Auditor Clarence Van Deusen, who recently returned from a trip through that part of the state.

H. F. Hartenbrower was recently appointed threshing inspector for Idaho. His duties will be to save grain wherever possible and his affiliations and co-operation with the threshermen and farmers will be with that end in view.

The call for 1000 special or limited service Idaho registrants to entrain July 29 for Syracuse, N. Y., has been cancelled by the provost marshal general. The men were to have been trained to act as guards and firemen at embarkation ports.

Eastern Idaho dry farmers will reap a war winning wheat harvest this fall, according to Byron Hunter, dry farm specialist for the states of Idaho, Oregon, Washington and northern California, who has been making a tour of dry land sections of Idaho during the past week.

EASY TO MISJUDGE CHILDREN

Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.


It is then loaded into a refrigerator car where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days.

Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.
