

IDAHO BUDGET

A Red Cross shop is to be opened at Boise about September 1.

Losses totalling approximately \$20,000 were suffered in a fire which destroyed the Hickerson block at Grangeville.

Approximately \$100,000 was realized from the sale of 12,000 acres of state land in Madison county at public auction last week.

Lloyd Hutcherson, Meridian's first son to be killed in action in France, laid down his life on the fields of France on June 19.

Ranchers from Hayden basin and parts of the upper Lemhi valley complain of a ravage of grasshoppers, or Rocky mountain locusts, which is the most destructive known in a good many years.

Military as well as political intervention in Russia by the United States was urged in the senate, by Senator Borah of Idaho, who declared that not until that has been accomplished could a lasting peace be made.

The Boise naval recruiting station is still looking for three watchmakers to enlist as machinists mates at \$66.50 a month with room, uniforms and lodging provided.

Boise city will furnish 57 of the 2000 men who leave Idaho during the five-day period beginning August 5, for Camp Fremont, Cal. Ada county will send 50. The largest number will come from Bonneville county, whose quota is 145.

Franklin and Gertrude Corbus, who were injured in an automobile wreck on the Mountain Home road, which resulted in the death of their mother, are reported to be steadily improving at a Boise hospital, and it is believed they are no longer in any danger.

Only 500 men will be left in class 1 of the first registration after the call for 1000 men on July 22 to entrain for Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., is filled, but the number is being increased daily by the reclassification of registrants formerly placed in deferred classes.

Official notice has been received that Loren Marlon Trotter, the first Caldwell boy to be killed in action in France, has been buried in France. His body will be brought here at the end of the war. He carried a life insurance policy of \$10,000 in favor of his parents.

Only thirteen counties of Idaho have indicated so far that as a result of their War Savings campaign, they have either reached their assigned quotas or have so nearly done so that Secretary Eaton believes they will forward completed reports to that effect in the near future.

Mrs. Lizzie Dickie of Boise, who has been placed at the head of the child's welfare work in Idaho for children's year—April 6, 1918, to April 6, 1919—is going at the work in a systematic way and proposes to enlist the patriotic men and women of every county in the state in the crusade.

"Fruit growers should make a close inspection of their orchards within the next week and decide whether there are enough apples to justify the expense of a cover spray for the second brood of codlin moth," says Guy Graham, state horticultural inspector, in a warning issued last week.

Fully one-half of all the peaches in the state of Idaho this year are at the Mesa orchard at Council, according to a fruit expert visiting the orchard this week. To care for the apple crop, which will be reasonably good, a storage warehouse with a capacity of 50,000 boxes will be added to the present equipment.

Lemhi county has donated to Red Cross and other drives under this catalogue a total of \$15,485, besides keeping up the regular work of the Red Cross chapter. And the Junior Red Cross of Lemhi county, on reports from the Seattle headquarters, stands second among all the counties of the entire northwest, including Alaska.

Mrs. Lizzie Dickie, state chairman for child welfare drive in Idaho, acting for the Children's Bureau at Washington, is appointing county chairmen, as rapidly as possible. The drive is intended to save the lives of 100,000 children of pre-school age in the nation and Idaho's quota is 350.

F. E. Rinehart, state animal husbandman, will make an extensive trip through Benewah and Clearwater counties during the latter part of the month in an endeavor to stimulate beef production, increase interest in the erection of silos and assist in the organization of community bull clubs.

R. F. Bicknell, federal food administrator, has issued an order effective Monday, July 15, which will close at 9 at night all places (except cigar stands and fruit stands) at which food, drink or merchandise is sold. Drug stores, restaurants and cafes and soda fountains are especially mentioned in the closing order.

The report of cholera among hogs at Boise appears to have been a mistake, the cases being due to faulty feeding, there being no cholera symptoms.

H. C. Heise, proprietor of the Heise Hot Springs, near Idaho Falls, has filed an informal complaint with the public utilities commission against an increase of ferry rates from 50 cents to 75 cents for the round trip on the upper ferry near that place.

Two Boise boys, Privates Charles D. Fulton and Albert L. Harie, were severely wounded in action in France on June 15, according to private telegrams received in Boise. Both were members of Company H of the former Second Idaho, and both are now in the Second engineers.

ADDED BEAUTY TO GARDENS

World Owes Debt to Frenchman Who Improved on the Glory of the Lilac Blossom.

One of France's war gardeners of 1870-71 won immortality by studying his plants, instead of tending his garden merely as a way to help out with the food supply. Like most war gardeners, he did not give his attention exclusively to vegetables but planted a few flowers, and it was with these that he had conspicuous success.

In 1871 Victor Lemoine began his experiments in cross-fertilizing different species of lilac. He took up this work to get his mind away from the troubles of his country, for a German garrison was quartered in his native town, Nancy, and the rest of France, except the doomed provinces of Alsace-Lorraine, was slowly buying back its freedom from the same hated presence. Lemoine's sight at that time was very bad, so he planned and had his wife execute.

That was the origin of the wondrous group of shrubs known today throughout the civilized world as "French lilacs," with their great trusses of beautiful bloom. It is Lemoine's best-known work, though not his only one. He recreated the mock orange, the deutzia, the weigelia, the delphinium, and a score of other perennials and shrubs.
