CHALLIS SCHOOLS WILL HOLD FESTIVAL, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 7

The Challis Schools are planning to hold their First Annual Fall Festival Friday October 7th. The event will be in the nature of an Agricultural and Home Art exhibit and carnival. The affair will be managed by the students of the Agricultural classes and all members of the school from the first to the twelfth grades will participate.

People of the town and country will be asked to offer small premiums for exhibits by the boys and girls. The purpose being to stimulate in the young people an interest in things of agricultural and home nature. In managing an event of this kind the agricultural students will receive some valuable lessons.

The forenoon of the day will be devoted to a street parade or pageant illustrative of historical events of Custer county. The afternoon will be used in viewing the exhibits, taking in the side shows and a continuous performance given by the school. At night a dance will be given for the benefit of the Challis Boy Band.

All this is a large undertaking on the part of the school and the cooperation and interest of the whole community is earnestly desired.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Office of the Board of County Commissioners of Custer County, Idaho, Challis, September 12, 1921

Pursuant to law the Board of County Commissioners of Custer County, Idaho, met this day for the purpose of determining the necessary levy on each \$100. valuation of taxable property of said County for the year 1921 for State and County purposes, fixing the levies of the several school districts, that had been certified to the Board, and also for the purpose of considering any and all Road matters.

Present: D. B. Drake, Chairman, Commissioners Frost and Ewing and E. J. Michael, Clerk

In the matter of fixing a tax rate on the assessable property of Custer Co. for the year 1921, it was ordered that said rate is hereby fixed at \$2.50 on each \$100. valuation of assessable property in said County, apportioned to the State and County Funds as follows:

Total for State and County Purposes \$2.50

For the purpose of meeting the special levy for the Predatory Animal Fund it was ordered that 3 mills be levied on each one dollar of the assessed valuation of all sheep and one half mill on each one dollar of the assessed valuation of all other classes of live stock, and collected as other taxes.

For the purpose of meeting the special levy for the Sheep Inspection Tax it was ordered that one-half mill be levied on each one dollar of the assessed valuation of all sheep, and collected as other taxes.

In the matter of determining the special levies of the several school districts, which have been certified to by the Trustees of said Districts, it was ordered that said levies be fixed upon each \$100. valuation of assessable property in each of said districts and collected and apportioned as follows:

NEWS OF THE CUSTER COUNTY CLEAN-UP SQUAD

The United States government is instituting a great Clean-up Drive among ex-service men, through the agencies of the government, the Red Cross and the American Legion, for the purpose of advising with ex-service men and adjusting any claim against the government involving insurance, compensation, etc.

The Clean-Up Squad, composed of a Medical Examiner, a Compensation and Insurance Claims Examiner, a Secretary, a representative of the American Legion, and a representative of the American Red Cross, will be in Mackay September 27th and 28th, for the purpose of examining and adjusting all claims in Custer County. The Squad may be found on those days at the offices of Whitcomb, Cowan and Clark, attorneys.

This Squad has full power to adjust all claims immediately and without any red tape, and every man or woman in Custer County with any claim has the opportunity to secure its adjustment. Disabled men will be re-examined and re-classified, emergency treatment will be given, and compensation and insurance will be adjusted by the Squad free of charge.

Dr. F. P. Richards of Mackay, has been designated as an examiner for the Veteran's Bureau, and will give free physical examinations up to the time of the arrival of and during the stay of the Squad. In any case where an examination will be necessary it would be advisable to secure the examination from Dr. Richards at once as this may be held at anytime pending the arrival of the Squad, and will help in getting claims in readiness on the 27th and 28th.

It is sincerely hoped that everyone in Custer County with any possible claim will take advantage of this opportunity of letting the government put itself right in the matter of any obligation to him. Every citizen of the county should take an active interest in the matter of seeing to it that every ex-service man with a claim gets his opportunity to secure free examination, advice and assistance from the Clean-Up Squad while it is in Mackay.
