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LOANS WILL NOT BE MADE DIRECT

BOISE, Ida., Sept 29—Bankers of the state who will visit the state of Idaho, visited Salt Lake, where they met Julius Myers of Washington, D. C., who has charge of that work. Loans are not to be made direct to borrowers, but to banks, trust companies, and to co-operative associations and livestock growers up on the collateral security of the stockgrowers' notes secured by mortgage on their property. Circulars of instructions and blank forms are to be sent the banks.

In discussing the situation Mr. Myers, who met the bankers of the state said: "The producer today must submit to the old law of supply and demand for what he has to sell and perhaps eventually, although too late, he might make his purchases when the law will govern. The manufacturer of all the producer has to buy has been able to exact his cost and profit regardless of conditions. The producer, if he disposed of his product at all, has been compelled to take what the demand offered. The loans now made possible by the operation of the recent legislation will make it possible for the growers to continue in the business until such time as they are able to dispose of their products advantageously."

"It was very evident both from Mr. Meyer's remarks that he is convinced that there can be no real prosperity in the country unless our farmers and stock growers can be engaged in profitable production and that any such uneven readjustment of the conditions resulting from the war as would cripple, almost to the point of destruction an industry like the livestock industry which it would require years to rebuild must prevent the early return of prosperity."

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RED BIRD MILL CON- TAINES 10 SHIP

Robert N. Bell, formerly State Mine inspector and now engaged in private mining in this county, passed through the city the latter part of last week on his way to Boise after having visited the Red Bird Mines in which he is interested on Squaw Creek above Clayton.

To a Miner reporter, Mr. Bell stated that the little mill was running very satisfactorily, producing two cars of concentrates per month, the value of which is about an ounce of silver to a unit of lead, much of the concentrates going as high as forty to fifty ounces. Mr. Bell stated that they had a world of ore in sight and that were it not for the limited mill capacity, the property could be employing many times more men than at present. He and his associates, the Snow Brothers, contemplate rebuilding the mill next spring and adding greatly to the equipment, thus materially enlarging their outfit. Even with limited milling operations, this company is adding considerably to the silver lead output of this district. The old Red Bird mine is one of the best properties in the rich upper country section of this county and justifies much larger operations than are at present taking place.—Miner.

HEAD OF STATE CONSTABULARY APPOINTED MARSHAL

Frank Breshers, head of the state constabulary, has been nominated by President Harding to the office of United States marshal for Idaho, succeeding Leroy Jones, demagogic appointee. Breshers will likely take his place on October 1. W. H. Hatt of Boise is expected to succeed Breshers as head of the constabulary.

LOST PACKER IS SOLD FOR \$250,000.00

The Lost Packer mine on Loon Creek in Custer county has just been purchased by the Bingham-Gaiene Company of Salt Lake City for a quarter of a million dollars, says the Boise Statesman. The mine has been idle for the past three years. It was purchased from the Ivers estate, and when Mr. Ivers died the property was closed down. It is a gold and copper proposition and has been a rich producer. The new owners will begin operations at once under the management of Eugene Grull, a mining engineer of note.

A party of five men, representing the interests of the purchasing company, left Hailey last Friday forenoon in a car driven by W. P. Fowler for the property, and they returned Tuesday evening. They went by way of the Galena summit and Yankee Fork, the distance being 125 miles. The highway was rough in places and on the return trip there was a foot of snow on the Loon creek divide. The party consisted of Geo. Graham Rice, the promoter of the deal, Harry Joseph, A. C. Christensen, George Lawrence and John Miller.

The Lost Packer is one of the best known and richest mines in the upper country and has operated extensively in the past. At one time, in 1910, there was over six hundred head of freight horses engaged in hauling supplies to the camp on Loon creek and the product of the smelter out to the railroad here in Mackay. Since then the country, state and Federal government have expended large sums of money in building highways from Mackay to the Upper Country, which is now enabling mining operators to ship by truck, several fleets are now operating out of Mackay at this time in a highly satisfactory manner.

This big improvement should at once be called to the attention of the recent purchasers of the property.—Miner.
