ELECTION GOES OFF QUIETLY IN CUSTER COUNTY AND BOURBONS IN MAJORITY

Judge Ralph W. Adair Wins in Sixth District by 1100; Brown Wins by 19 and Job by 28. Democratic Legislators Elected

The election here last Tuesday and throughout the county went off in a quiet and orderly manner. The democratic ticket was elected in the county.

Judge Ralph W. Adair was elected to succeed himself as Judge of the Sixth Judicial District by a majority of 1100 in the district.

The contest between Adamson and Brown was close, Brown finally winning by 19.

As the returns came in it was neck and neck between Job and Keyser for Probate Judge, Job winning by a majority of 28.

The contest between Baker and S. B. Clark for State Senator gave Clark the democrat ticket a majority of 47.

Sheriff Cummins, republican candidate for re-election was very popular at the polls and came out of the race with the handsome majority of 487.

Dan Burnett, democratic candidate to succeed himself as assessor was next to Cummins in popularity, receiving a majority of 243.

The work of compiling the returns from the County has been a long and strenuous task and that is the reason for the Messenger being late this week.

At the official canvass the vote as we have given it in this issue may be slightly changed in some instances but not enough to change the result as published.

Poison in Mushroom Cap.

Animals usually know what is good for them and squirrels will consume the stalks of poisonous mushrooms without any apparent ill-effects. The cap of the plant is left. This suggests that the poison may be contained in the rejected portion, the escape of the feeding squirrels not being due to any special immunity. But the subject requires careful investigation.

Great Reservoirs of India.

For conserving her water supply there are to be found in India tremendous artificial lakes. At Dhebar, in the Rajputana province, for instance, there is a reservoir with a superficial area of 21 square miles; the masonry dam measuring over 300 yards in length and 32 yards in height. In southern India, too, there are several reservoirs over 12 square miles in area.
