The Cottonwood Hotel is now nearing completion and will soon be ready for occupancy. The carpenters, Jake Woodring and Buck Bates, will be through in a couple of days and Ed Ogan will soon finish up painting and paper hanging. No one seems to know as yet who will be the next occupant.

Baker City, Ore., June 5.—The coldest weather for a period of twenty years was recorded in Baker City last night. The mercury fell six degrees below freezing point. Ice was formed in pools of water on the streets over an inch thick. All the fruit, such as cherries, apples, pears, prunes and plums, was killed and vegetables were destroyed. So far as known the growing grain was not seriously injured. The weather is cold tonight.—Tribune.

Frank Carey, a young man living near Greencreek, was arrested on a warrant sworn out by Archie Lee last Monday. The charge is that of shooting with murderous intent. Mr. Lee says that while he and his wife were sitting up prior to retiring Saturday night Carey and two other lads rode past his house and that the accused shot through a window with his pistol, very narrowly missing Mrs. Lee and the baby. The case has been set for 10 a. m. today, but as we print before that time we have not learned the result.

Jas. Carlin and R. Reynolds were last Monday arrested by Constable Blackburn on the charge of grand larceny. Three or four saddles belonging to different parties, a quantity of bacon and some pillows belonging to Asa Jones, and numerous other things have recently disappeared and the parties arrested have been accused of stealing them. The bacon, pillows and what is supposed to be the covering off the horn of Hans Petersen's saddle were found in the house belonging to the prisoners. A son of Reynolds, who is also supposed to be implicated, has not yet been found and it is thought he has made good his escape. Reynolds is a married man living in town and is the father of a large family of children. Both men are recently from Vineland. The preliminary hearing began yesterday morning and is still in progress. Several witnesses have been examined but the ultimate result cannot as yet be determined. The trial is being conducted in the three story building opposite the St. Albert Hotel and it may be two or three days before a decision can be rendered. There is no stenographer in this town and the evidence is being taken in long hand by ye editor, which will naturally delay proceedings to a great extent.

DOG & PONY SHOW.

The greatest number on the program was the exciting fire scene in which two ponies make a slide for life and a dog and monkey fire brigade put out the fire. Take it all it was the best show that has been in Spokane for a long time and will always be accorded a hearty welcome whenever it comes to Spokane."

JOSEPH KELCH INSANE.

No little excitement and consternation was caused last Tuesday afternoon by the appearance on our streets of a prosperous Greencreek farmer, Joseph Kelch, in an insane condition. Kelch, it seems, had gone up to the Catholic church and by his peculiar actions had caused some little comment, but no one took much heed of him until he came down town and in a loud voice said: "Jesus Christ wants all of you to come up to the Catholic church so I can talk to you. I am the pope." He paraded the street a short time making this announcement when Justice Wolbert issued a warrant and Constable Blackburn took Kelch in charge. Awaiting advice from the county seat the constable held the unfortunate man on the street here by strategy for about half an hour, during which time Kelch alternately exhorted the bystanders to be saved and prayed in German and English. He was taken to Mt. Idaho by Constable Blackburn and Deputy Manning. Kelch is a fine appearing man and talks very rationally except on religion. He has a wife and family living near Greencreek, and it is said he has previously shown signs of religious mental aberration. On the former occasion he thought he was commissioned by the pope to kill six men and it took four strong men to hold him.
