A. F. Parker, of Grangeville, accompanied by H. L. Chamberlain, of Ontario, Canada, were looking over this side of the prairie this week with the view of investing in some of our fine farming land.

Col. Dewey has sold the claims that he bonded from the Caswell brothers, at \$100,000, to Pittsburg capitalists for \$1,500,000, subject to expert examination. Ed Gilligan, an old time Cottonwood boy, and our townsman, J. M. Wollert, own the claim that joins this property on the east, and their claim is said to be equally good as any of the group sold.

Well, the Glorious Fourth is past and gone. We have all returned home after spending nearly a week celebrating in out of town places (the most of us) and all kinds of resolutions are being formed about celebrations hereafter. The majority of our people, including the ball team, went to Grangeville, where there was an immense crowd for three days, and it is about baseball there that we wish to say a few words. There was an understanding (no definite written bargain) that our boys expenses were to be paid if they came to Grangeville, and the official program stated that they were to play Grangeville the first day. When the team arrived another base ball schedule was made out, compelling our boys to play the "rooters" (of Grangeville) the first day or be barred from the contest. The "rooters" saved us from being barred by refusing to play themselves, thus shutting them out, and leaving the contest for the purse between Cottonwood, Grangeville and Stites. Cottonwood and Grangeville played, our side losing by a score of 7 to 13. Stites was billed to play Grangeville the second day, but were also compelled to play the "rooters" (who were altogether out of the contest) but the "rooters" again refused to play and the Stites boys got angry and went home. According to written agreement this left the purse contest between Cottonwood and Grangeville. But no, we were given no more show for the purse, and Grangeville played the "rooters" the afternoon of the 5th, the score being 14 to 7 in favor of the "rooters." Our boys had been held over a day under the promise of a game for grand stand receipts (having understood that they would be compelled to stand their own expenses) and Seth Jones and Nick Sweeney put up a \$50 forfeit to bet \$200 on a game that day but could not get it covered. The promised game never came off but we were told we could play the next day for half the grand stand receipts. After being in as deep as we were there was nothing left to do but stay and play. The game was between Cottonwood and the "rooters" and resulted in a score of 13 to 3 in favor of Cottonwood. The grand stand receipts amounted to \$8.50 for Cottonwood and through the kindness of Seth Jones it was raised to \$20.75. Mr. Jones collected a purse of \$12.25 which he presented to the winning team. Our boys came home, being allowed no more show for the big purse, a sadder but wiser lot, and the next time the ball team celebrates for four days at any one place it will probably be at Cottonwood.
