GENERAL NEWS

Guthrie, O. T., Sept. 14.—Crazy Snake, a Creek Indian, who led the rebellion last spring against the government, has been released and is again inciting his people to throw off the white man's power.

The president asked the members of the McKinley cabinet to retain their portfolios throughout his term, and announced that this administration would follow the policy outlined by McKinley in his Buffalo speech.

The Jewish people last Saturday celebrated their New Year. This year will, according to the Jews, conclude 5662 years that have passed since the creation of the world. The New Year, or Rosh Hashonah (head of the year) opens a very significant festival season of ten days which will be devoted to penitence, ending with the day of atonement—Yom Kippur.

E. S. Kinney, general manager for the Sweeney syndicate, arrived in the city yesterday en route to Buffalo Hump where he will spend two months thoroughly exploiting the syndicate's properties at the Hump. He expects to put a large force of men at work, but further than that he would do as much work as possible before cold weather sets in, he would not speak.

Pekin, Sept. 17.—The Chinese troops re-entered Pekin today. The evacuation was picturesque. The Japanese and American troops were drawn up at the inner gate. Several hundred Chinese civil and military officials, diplomats, officers and ladies were massed upon the plaza outside. The Japanese and Chinese bands played and the foreigners marched out through the gates they had battered in over a year ago.

John O. Levander, of Goff, has sold a large tract of placer ground on Salmon river to a Chicago company, and they have arranged to install a complete hydraulic plant on their premises and operate the property for all it is worth. The expert, as we are informed, reported to his principals that the ground contained all of \$250,000 worth of gold, and that it was a first-class proposition all around.—Free Press.

Boise, Sept. 13.—On motion of the plaintiff, the mining suit instituted by Patsy Clark and associates vs. Charles Sweeney and associates was abandoned in the federal court today. This is the action in which Clark sued to recover \$1,000,000 from Sweeney, alleging fraud in the purchase of the Ella mining claim in the Coeur d'Alenes. By the terms of the abandonment of the action Clark is given the privilege of making underground surveys in the disputed ground.

Will Lewiston teachers have to submit to examinations by the state board? is the issue now being contested between the state board and the Lewiston school board. Lewiston is an independent school district created by a special charter which authorizes the local board to examine and license its own teachers. The state board has carried the matter to the Attorney General and has from him an opinion that unless the teachers hold state certificates money from the state will be withheld from the district. The Lewiston board has placed the question in the hands of its attorney and will act on his advice.
