The Grangeville street fair was a grand success in every respect. The exhibits of fruits, vegetables, grains, live stock, minerals, etc., were a surprise to all as no one expected to see such a display at the first fair held on Camas Prairie. The crowd was enormous each day, every section of Idaho county being liberally represented. This shows what Camas Prairie can do in the way of fruits, vegetables, etc., and next year everyone will be raising prize winners and should the fair be repeated as it undoubtedly will be, Lewiston will have

to look to her laurels or she may lose them.

The citizens' meeting held last Friday evening was well attended and the question of incorporation was settled to the satisfaction of nearly everyone present. The question was discussed at length and resulted in a motion being put before the house to incorporate three fourths of a mile square. This motion was killed by a nearly unanimous vote. After some further discussion and an explanation of the plat presented, a motion was made to incorporate a mile square, according to the plat, which motion was voted upon and carried unanimously. The suggestion was then made to elect five men to recommend to the county commissioners as trustees for the village. This suggestion took the form of a motion and was carried through. A ballot vote was then taken, which resulted in the election of the following men: W. L. Brown, H. H. Nuxoll, A. B. Rooke, S. J. Peterson and Sam'l Goldstone. The petition was produced and signed by those present and a committee, consisting of A. B. Rooke, W. L. Brown and Kale Burge, appointed to have it circulated and signed. The petition and plat will be laid before the county commissioners at their next meeting and we expect to have it favorably acted upon and to soon see Cottonwood an incorporated village like other enterprising burghs.
