He had been to Westlake the day previous and had returned home with his winter's supply of provisions. It seems that upon entering the house he bent over the wood box to take out a stick preparatory to building a fire, when death overtook him. The remains were interred here with the beautiful rites of the Odd Fellows last Tuesday. Josiah G. Peasley was born near Bangor, Maine, about 60 years ago. ORDINANCE NO. 6.

An ordinance providing for the construction of certain sidewalks in the Village of Cottonwood.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Cottonwood.

Section 1. That a sidewalk be constructed on the west side of King street in accordance with ordinance No. 5 from Main street to Church street. Also on the east side of King street from Main street to Front street.

Section 2. That a sidewalk be constructed on both sides of Main street from Idaho street to Front street.

Section 3. That a sidewalk be constructed on the southeast side of Broadway street from Main street to South 4th street.

Section 4. That all crosswalks necessary to the completion of above sidewalks be built by the Village of Cottonwood.

Section 5. That all sidewalks already constructed in accordance with ordinance No. 5 shall be accepted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Cottonwood.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and publication.
