Grangeville, Dec. 8.—The preliminary examination of Seth Jones, Sr., charged with raising the rate of interest in a note, was completed yesterday before Justice Jaques, resulting in the discharge of Jones. On account of the prominence of the accused unusual interest has been taken in the examination, which was extended through nearly the whole of the past week. The note alleged to have been altered was given over four years ago by H. W. Stevenson to Jones and was left at the bank for payment about a month ago, when the signer, Stevenson, claimed to have discovered the change of from 1 per cent per annum to 12 per cent. There seemed to be no doubt of the alteration, but no proof that the defendant was in any way concerned in it.—Tribune.

**ORDINANCE NO. 6.—SEC. 7.**

An additional section to Ordinance No. 6 specifying the time in which sidewalks shall be built and providing a way to build said sidewalks in case property owners fail to build or construct them.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Cottonwood. Section 7. All persons owning property along the line of the sidewalk as required to be built by sections 1, 2, 3 and 4 of ordinance No. 6 are hereby required to build or cause to be built in front of their respective premises a sidewalk of dimensions and material as required by ordinance No. 6 of the Village of Cottonwood on or before the 27th day of January, 1902. In case said sidewalk as hereinbefore required to be built is not built or constructed by the owner or owners of said premises on or before said 27th day of January, 1902, then said sidewalk shall be built and constructed by the Village of Cottonwood and the cost of building and constructing the same shall be assessed against the lot or lots in front of which the said sidewalk shall be built or constructed by the said village as aforesaid as an assessment for improvements, and shall be collected as other special assessments. This addition to ordinance No. 6 shall be in force from and after its passage and publication. Passed and approved this 7th day of December, 1901.
