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## WORK IS PROGRESSING

Many Grangeville People  
will Celebrate at this Place

The nearer we get to the Glorious Fourth the more earnest and enthusiastic our citizens are becoming in regard to giving a grand celebration. The CHRONICLE early in the week printed a large number of big red, white and blue posters and they have been scattered far and near by the committee on printing. The committee on race track and several other people have been employed all week fixing up a good track on the hill near the school house and the committee on arrangements and the executive committee are always busy in fixing up the details. As the great day draws nearer it becomes daily more evident that we are not only going to have one of the grandest celebrations ever held on the prairie but also a large crowd to witness it. The baseball tournament alone will bring a large concourse of people from our neighboring towns and the Cottonwood citizens have agreed among themselves to spare no endeavor in making everyone who is here glad they came, regardless of expense. The grounds will be decorated in splendid shape, the ladies having taken an active interest in that feature as well as attending to the liberty car part of the program.

The peerless orator of three counties, the Hon. Clay McNamee, will be the

orator of the day.

If you expect to see a good celebration and do not want to be disappointed, come to Cottonwood.

At a mass meeting held in Grangeville last Monday evening it was definitely determined to drop the announced celebration on the 5th of July, and it was agreed that everyone who could would go to Cottonwood and help us celebrate in grand style. Furthermore, the Grangeville people agreed to send their hand over here without expense to us on that day. The ball nine had already promised us to come and it is very likely that the entire celebration at Grangeville may yet be called off. At any rate it is known that some of Grangeville's foremost business men have signed a petition to that end, stating that it was no more than right that Grangeville reciprocate this year for the way Cottonwood used them last year. Besides this consideration there are others to take into consideration by the "big town of the prairie" and they are too well known by its inhabitants to need explanation in these columns. We had an idea at first that Grangeville was not going to use us right, but it looks now as if she was really going to open her heart and do the right thing. Well, neighbor, one good turn deserves another and is always appreciated.

Mrs. Rosa McClay, of Iola, Kansas, eldest daughter of Postmaster Libbey, is visiting here. Mr. McClay is expected to arrive in this section in the near future.

Seven loads of lumber from Wright's mill passed through here Monday. The lumber was being hauled for the erection of a church at Hopewell school-house.

Aaron and Charlie Kelly and Fred Wolbert left Wednesday morning with a pack train for the Marshall Lake country. They will go in by way of White Bird.

Stuber Bros. left here last Saturday with another shipment of hogs for Seattle, consisting of 400 head. Howard McKinley and Herman Stuber will accompany the shipment to its destination.

The Cleophas Bros., of Northwood, Iowa, have been in the city the past few days. Mr. Knute Cleophas is the banker who was here a few weeks ago. He has purchased the ranch now rented by Willis Angell.

Jacob Giesen and Wm. Kabeisenmann, of Parkston, S. D., are among the new arrivals in this section this week. They are visiting with their old friend, B. Thacke, and are looking over the country with a view to locating.

A pack train of seventeen fine big animals passed through here yesterday enroute to the upper Salmon river, near the Seven Devils. The outfit was a government surveying party which has several townships of government land to survey in that region.

Harry Tefft, while out boat riding with his brother, Bert, on the Salmon river last Saturday, fell against the side of the boat and suffered internal injuries. Dr. Truitt was hastily summoned and reports that now the boy is getting along nicely.

Nels Larson, a brother of Mrs. August Jorgenson, arrived here Wednesday from Winnipeg, Manitoba, for a week's visit with relatives. Mr. Larson is connected with railroad construction up north and says his section of the country is booming.

Attorneys Alshie and Fogg were over from Grangeville Tuesday and Wednesday. We don't know, but we surmise strongly that their business was of a political nature and it is nearly safe to say that the county seat proposition occupied no small share their time.

The Cleophas Bros. are thinking seriously of starting a bank here and in an interview with us stated that as soon as they could get their business in proper shape they would open up such an institution at this place. They are very confident that they could sit down right here and coin money. It would be a good thing for the town and we would like to see it come.

County Surveyor Pogne has finished the survey of the proposed new road across Lawyer's canyon in this county, and it is expected that the residents on the Nezperce side will take necessary steps to extend it down to the Clearwater river. In fact, the Farmers' Grain company has signified its willingness to aid in the completion of this road, which will be of great benefit to the people of both counties.—Press.

The republican central committee met at Grangeville Saturday and designated July 26th as the date to hold the convention to nominate delegates to the state convention. Cottonwood was selected as the point to hold the convention. The state convention will be held at Boise, August 20th, and the convention to nominate a county ticket will be held at Grangeville on September 6th. The primaries to elect delegates to the convention at this place will be held all over the county on July 19th.
