Some of the republican papers around the state are going to be awfully short of "dope," now that the Brady press bureau at Boise has shut down sending out the canned article.

One or two candidates who were running on their records of law enforcement did not weather the storm in very good shape. Must have been some holes in their bark that the voters could see through.

The democratic ticket won over two thirds of the offices in this county this election and the beauty of it is that neither the "whiskey element" (?) nor the "dries" can claim the victory as all their own.

The Stites Sentinel refers to the CHRONICLE as a "water-logged wet paper." Well, perhaps it is, but its editor is not "water-logged" and hasn't been for many years, which is more than some of our contemporaries can say.

When a man stands for certain principles because he believes them to be right and yet loses out he still has the consolation of knowing that he was square with himself and no hypocrite. Some of the "double-shoulder" artists in the campaign just ended will not have even this small consolation to bear them company on their journey to the head waters of Salt Creek.

The future political aspirations of governor Brady went into an eclipse Tuesday, through which they will doubtless never pass, and that much coveted senatorial position is an air castle that will never be realized. It was not democrats alone who, by their votes, told the governor he was unfit to continue as chief executive of this great state, but many republicans who voted for him

two years ago helped to take him from his high position and but a better man in his place. The governor is ambitious but in spite of the political machine he has succeeded in building up during the past two years he had yet to reckon with the voters of the state and the voters decided that his personal aims and desires made him a dangerous man to continue in office—dangerous at least to the welfare of the state and its people. So after January 1st he can go back to his private affairs and try to make back the enormous sums he has spent in a losing political campaign. And there are not a great many, other than his personal friends and mercenary sycophants, who will grieve long over his going.

"Uncle" Frank Roberts, of the Stites Sentinel, took us to task recently over an editorial in which we stated that Idaho county paid something over \$10,000 to the state in taxes in 1901 and will pay over \$31,000 this year and asking the voter if it was not about time for a housecleaning. Uncle Frank termed our article "democratic umpah," whatever that may mean, and said in part "but he overlooks the further fact that the tax levy in Idaho county is chargeable to the negligence of the only Democratic officer elected at the last election," meaning, we suppose, Mr. Wilson. "Umpah" or not, can you charge the same reason for the increase in state taxes for this county from \$11,804.24 under Governor Morrison in 1904 to \$27,576.30 under Governor Gooding in 1907? And by the way, John V. Nash, the best assessor either party has had in office in the past ten years, was serving the people of Idaho county in 1907-8. Play fair, Uncle Frank, let the blame fall where it may.

The Mormon church, charged for years with interference in politics, could be given cards and spades and be beaten at its own game by the Idaho County Ministerial Association. That "dry" ticket sent out just before election was a pretty scurvy piece of work, to say the least, and lost the "cause" about as many votes as it gained for it.

From the way New York, Ohio and other eastern states went democratic Tuesday it looks as if a condition of unrest and dissatisfaction had existed there for some time which even the insurgent republican movement could not allay. When any political party holds office so long that dissention springs up in its own ranks it is high time for a change. The good man of no party can be blinded forever and when they do see light they usually take time by the forelock and proceed to weed out the evil in the shortest possible manner.
