The Grangeville Globe still contends that Governor Alexander ought to be censured for slandering Idaho county by making certain statements when he vetoed the Salmon river bridge bill and contends the governor should at least have offered an apology after the mistake was called to his attention. The governor's mistake was an excusable one. He simply took the figures as shown by the auditor's report from the various counties and these figures, if taken from the column of levies alone, do not show this county up in a very favorable light. Furthermore, Idaho county is perhaps the only one in the state that had to take advantage of a state law to secure its rights by organizing into highway districts and the governor was again excusable in not realizing that such conditions existed here and looking up the highway levies along with the county road and bridge levies.

As to that apology, it seems to us it really belongs to the highway districts rather than to the county at large and as the governor has made good his promise of saving the taxpayers of our state a million dollars of taxes our highway commissioners do not seem to be clamoring very loudly for the apology due them.

Instead of camping on the governor's trail we might offer a suggestion that the Globe get busy a little nearer home and have our commissioners explain why they spent over ten thousand dollars more money for road and bridge purposes in the unorganized portions of this county in 1913 than was collected in these funds and then turned into the redemption fund where it will have to be borne by the entire county, and most of it by the independent highway districts as an additional burden besides their own special levies each year.

According to the Kamiah Progress a delegation of citizens from that place recently appeared before the board of county commissioners of Idaho county and were promised an appropriation of \$3000 toward purchasing the toll bridge across the Clearwater at Kamiah and making it a free bridge. Under ordinary circumstances there would be little complaint about such an appropriation but as things exist at present in Idaho county we can see but little reason for spending county funds in this manner. Idaho county needs bridges across the Clearwater and Salmon rivers in several places but she also needs roads much worse than bridges. The toll bridge at Kamiah is no more of a drawback to the residents of that section than the numerous ferries in this county where a price is charged to cross the stream. The commissioners might just as well try to place the ferries on the free list as to purchase a part of the toll bridge. That \$3000 would practically complete a road from the Joseph to the Salmon river, giving the residents of that section an outlet to the railroad, or it could be used to good advantage on other highways where it would be of far greater benefit in developing our county than in making the toll bridge a free institution.
