

### LET'S KEEP IN THE LEAD

Cottonwood has a reputation all over the country as being one of the richest rural communities in the entire Inland Empire and the principal reasons for this are that our farm holdings are still reasonably small and our farmers are following diversified farming to a larger extent than their neighbors. Lack of transportation for many years is largely responsible for this condition as it forced the farmers to feed their grain to cattle and hogs and drive the animals to market, and this proved so advantageous that even after the railroad came most of our farmers stuck to the old method and continued to raise large numbers of cattle and hogs instead of going grain crazy, as have many in other sections. As a result Cottonwood, and the country tributary to this town, ships more hogs annually than any other producing station west of the Rocky Mountains, besides shipping large numbers of cattle, hundred reds of cars of grain and large quantities of cream every year. These various articles of produce are turned off at all times of the year and mean a steady stream of wealth pouring into the pockets of our farmers and stockmen and from them into the natural channels of trade. This makes good times in the community and results in larger bank accounts and a better condition among our citizens generally than exist in less favored sections.

It is nice to possess such a financial reputation as Cottonwood has throughout the country and, like all valued possessions, we should try hard to retain it. Other sections, however, are patterning after our methods of diversification and are gradually creeping up on us in a financial way so that it will keep us hustling to stay in the lead in future unless we grasp the various opportunities that confront us from time to time. If we lie dormant for any length of time or fail to keep up with the procession of progress we shall soon be outstripped by some other section and perhaps never be able to regain our lost prestige.

To this end we should not be satisfied with what we have been able to accomplish thus far but should continue to follow out diversification along farming lines to the fullest extent—raising better livestock, rotating the crops and growing more grain without robbing the soil of its richness, utilizing the summer-fallow ground for producing silage crops, growing more alfalfa and clover, erecting silos on every farm, selling more cream or establishing creameries of our own. If we follow out these methods promptly and intelligently we shall continue to keep in the lead and at the same time accumulate our full share of this world's prosperity, enjoyment and general satisfaction.

### Ordinance No. 89

An ordinance to be known as the annual appropriation bill of the Village of Cottonwood, Idaho, for the fiscal year beginning with the first Tuesday of May, 1915, and ending with the first Monday in May, 1916; appropriating money for the payment of officers and employees of said Village, and for the general expenses and liabilities of said Village of Cottonwood, Idaho, during said year.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Cottonwood, Idaho, Section 1. That there is hereby appropriated of the money now in the Village treasury or to come into the Treasury of the Village of Cottonwood, Idaho, during the fiscal year as specified in the title of this ordinance, and not otherwise appropriated the sum of Five Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$5300.00), for the payment of officers and employees of said Village and for the general expenses and liabilities of said Village for said fiscal year. Said fund to be known as the Current Expense Fund.

Sec. 2. That all moneys coming into the Village Treasury during said fiscal year shall be apportioned as follows: All moneys received from the sale of cemetery lots shall be apportioned to the Cemetery Fund; and all other moneys coming into the treasury of said Village shall be apportioned to the Current Expense Fund.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

Following is a report of the stock market at Portland for the week ending July 12:

The first of the week run of cattle began with a registration of 1000 head, Monday's market starting off briskly at about steady prices on steers, a carload of choice ones going at \$7.00 for tops, others of a little less quality bringing \$6.75. She stuff showed a weakness and closed at 10 to 15 cents off.

Hogs do not show any improvement in regard to the character of offerings; out of the 2700 received none were in prime shape. Market considered steady to shade lower, tops bringing \$7.00.

Choice lambs no doubt would bring \$6.50, ewes and wethers proportion. 1700 changed hands Monday morning at an even price with last week.
