

Feeding Beet Pulp

Craig Mountain Farmers Find an Excellent Feed for Developing Young Cattle.

A cheap feed for young and growing cattle has been discovered by a number of farmers and stockmen of the Craig mountain country and their experiences are pointing the way for caring for the young cattle during the winter period.

The new feed is beet pulp and ground oats with a strawstack to provide the rough feed. The daily ration of beet pulp and ground oats will not exceed 2 cents for young calves and the condition of the young stock that has been fed on this ration for the past month is the best evidence of its value. The fact is this young stock is now in fit condition for the butcher's block and it is believed that calves can be taken from a milk ration when very young and developed rapidly on the combination of beet pulp and oats.

It is explained by stockmen of the mountain country that the dried and ground beet pulp can be purchased from dealers for 2 cents a pound. This is placed in water and soaked for several hours and two pounds of the pulp will fill an ordinary candy bucket. The soaked pulp is then mixed with the ground oats and a feed is provided that is not only very nutritious but is much relished by the young cattle. Each animal is given a ration of this

mixture each night and morning and with a strawstack to provide rough feed the farmers have put away all troubles over their young stock for the entire winter.

The experiment is a new one for the farmers and stockmen of the upper country, but the results attained have been so satisfactory that those using the new feed have no hesitancy in recommending it to their neighbors. It is explained that this manner of feeding has more advantages than the mere fact that it is a very satisfactory feed for the young cattle. It is pointed out that only small corrals are needed. The straw is stacked conveniently to the sheds and corrals and by the use of beet pulp and oats the young stock is given protection from the storms of winter and is turned out in the spring in fine condition for ranging. Where a careful check on the feeding cost has been made it is estimated the beet pulp and ground oats fed will not exceed 2 cents per day for each animal and where the feeding period will not exceed five months the expense will not exceed \$6 per head. In the meantime the young animal has been adding to its growth and frame development as rapidly during the winter as in the most favored open season and at the end of the second year the market price of the animal is enough above the value of young cattle wintered under former conditions to more than offset the expense and trouble of the beet and oat feeding.
