THE GOVERNOR'S PROMISE

When Governor Alexander told the people that if they would give the democratic party control of state affairs he would insure them of a saving for them of a million dollars during his term of office, republicans jeered and said he couldn't save a cent. The people did not give the democratic party control either in the legislature or the state house and now the republicans are jeering because the governor in his minor capacity has been able to save to the people during the first year of his administration only the insignificant sum of \$230,000, a mere bagatelle. This small savings was made, of course, over the protest of the republican majority in the state house. To this last statement there is one notable exception. We refer to the conduct of his department by State Treasurer John Eagleson.

Alexander told the people that the capitol building could be maintained at half the expense of the former administration. Mr. Eagleson almost demonstrated that fact the past year, and will undoubtedly do it this year. The state game department has also made a splendid showing.—Parma Herald.

A traffic expert sent out by a Chicago firm to ascertain the reason for non-delivering of freight to New York by the railroads reports that fully one hundred thousand cars filled with freight of all kinds are standing on sidings between the two cities while storage warehouses, platforms and even the ground along the tracks is filled with delayed freight. Only one through road from Chicago to New York has its tracks clear. A large part of the freight above mentioned is said to be war material and the expert states that he was informed by a New York banking firm that the Schwab plants alone are turning out more war munitions than all the English factories combined. And yet, in the face of all this ability to turn out war material on short notice, the people of the eastern states are clamoring for national preparedness. What we really need is more national efficiency in all departments. More factories to turn our raw products into finished articles for home consumption. More merchant vessels to carry our surplus products to the parts of foreign nations and bring back freight from those countries. War orders are not going to last forever and it is high time the future prosperity of our country was being considered and plans being made to care for the needs of the entire country instead of a few money-mad millionaire manufacturers.

North Idaho at last has a candidate for governor in the person of Geo. E. Crum, of Lewiston. Mr. Crum has been prominently mentioned for some time as a possible candidate on the republican ticket and his announcement this week comes as no surprise to the general public. Mr. Crum has been a resident of Lewiston since 1899 and has been prominent in public affairs. He is a partner in the well known firm of White Bros. & Crum and has

twice been elected to the state senate from Nez Perce county. Mr. Crum is a good, substantial business man and will undoubtedly do his best to give the state a businesslike administration if elected. As a northern man he will undoubtedly draw largely from all parties at the polls and will be a power to reckon with in the coming campaign.

Easter Sunday this year comes almost at the latest possible date. This is the 23d of April. Just twice in the last century has Easter Sunday been on such a late date and this was in the years 1848 and 1905. It will not occur again on this date until the year 2000. In 1943 Easter Sunday will come on April 25. This is the latest possible date it can come and it appears only once in 200 years on that late date. If a late Easter is any indication of a late spring then we are in for winter for weeks yet. However, we have noticed that spring comes when it gets ready and does not wait for Easter to tell it when to put in an appearance.—Ex.

One of the best forms of national preparedness, according to our inferior judgment, would be to keep well posted on what other nations are doing in the way of explosives and big guns and be able to duplicate their best efforts whenever the occasion demands. We have no reason to expect war and it is hardly good business to turn out monster guns and battle-ships at enormous expense and have them become obsolete every few years.

Twenty-three vessels of various types, representing an aggregate cost of \$8,258,000, are now under construction at Seattle ship yards or have been contracted for. This ought to boom the lumber industry on the coast a trifle at least.


